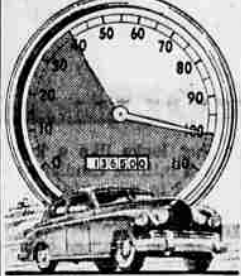
Eagle Point, Glendale Winners in Rogue Loop

North GP Cops Foul Filled Tilt

After trailing by 17 points at half time, the North Grants Pass Junior High school ninth grade came from behind to tip the Hedrick Hornets 58 to 56, in a tightly called basketball game which saw 61 fouls called and 94 free shots attempted on the Hornet court Friday.

Hedrick seventh grade downed NGP seventh 21 to 19. The eighth grade Hornets also won by rolling NGP 39 to 26.

In the second half of the ninth grade conflict, the Hornets watched a 17-point lead melt away until they led by only nine at the three-quarter break. The score read 45 to 36. Jim Thompson dropped in two foul shots with four minutes remaining in the fray to put the Cavekids into the lead for the first time at 50 to 49. GP then moved out to a five point spread with three minutes left.

The Hornets cut the lead to one marker with 43 seconds to go at 55 to 54, but Mike Blume dropped in a gifter and Thompson a jumper to give the Cavekids a four-tally spread with 11 seconds remaining. Mike Ralston put in a Hedrick jumper close out the scoring.

Nine players left the game because of five fouls, in a game which saw the Hornets drop in 13 field goals and 30 of 50 giffers. The Cavekids hit 14 fielders and 30 of 44 foul shots.

In the seventh grade game the Hornets edged the Cougars in a close played conflict which saw each team make only one point in the first quarter. At the half the score was 6-6, the third period was 18 to 15 in favor of the Hornets. Hornet Mike Fauton took scoring laurels with 12, and Dave Vanell and Steve Newman each picked up five for the Cavekids.

Larry Vowell, led the Hornets to victory over the GP eighth graders. Hedrick led at every break, 7 to 6, 21 to 16 and 35 to 17. Vowell had 13 points while Gary Van Kolen led the Cougars with 9.

Great Grid Men Meet In Pro Bowl

Los Angeles — (EP) — The world's greatest football players — the stars of the Western and Eastern conferences — meet Sunday in the 10th annual Pro Bowl game for the benefit of charity.

Led by quarterback Johnny Unitas of the world champion Baltimore Colts, the Western All-Stars were favored by 3 1/2 points to do to the Eastern All-Stars what the Colts did to the New York Giants in the NFL championships.

For the Western team coached by Red Hickney will be somewhat of a parallel to the club Unitas led to victory last month. It has two of his favorite passing targets, end Ray Berry and halfback Lenny Moore. And to them were added two great Los Angeles Rams receivers, end Del Shofner and halfback Jon Arnett, who also is no minor figure as a runner. J. D. Smith of the San Francisco Forty Niners fills the fullback spot.

Coch Buck Shaw's Eastern team has Norman van Brocklin and Bobby Layne alternating at quarterback and supplies a New York Giant triple-threat touch in halfback Frank Gifford. With Tommy McDonald to alternate with Gifford as a receiver at the other halfback spot, the East may be throwing more to its backs than to its ends. And in Jim Brown at fullback the squad has one of the all-time great stars of the game for short yardage that sometimes stretches the length of the gridiron.

Twyman Tallies Personal Press International

Jack Twyman must be wondering what super-human efforts he can employ to take over the scoring lead in the National Basketball association.

Twyman achieved a personal high of 59 points Friday night to lead Cincinnati to a 122-118 victory over the Minneapolis Lakers.

But Twyman fell six short of tying Wilt Chamberlain for the league lead as the Philadelphia Whiz Kid tallied 44 points in the Warriors 124-112 loss to the Boston Celtics.

In the only other action, St. Louis battled to a 141-140 overtime triumph against the Syracuse Nationals.
