Globetrotters to Play All-Nations Quintet Tonight

The fabulous Harlem Globetrotters basketball team against the colorful San Francisco All-Nations, and five acts of professional entertainment are on the bill for Rogue Valley fans at Hedrick Junior high school gym tonight.

Abe Saperstein's Trotters, whose exploits have written cage history and whose comic diodes mixed with superlative play have entertained many millions around the world, will seek to maintain their season's unbeaten status against the All-Nations.

Lineup of Comedians

The Globetrotters have one of the finest lineups of comedians, razzle dazzle artists and all-around players in their long history, which has seen them chalk up 6,525 victories against 303 defeats.

Their lineup is headed by Bob (Showboat) Hall, famed comedian of past years with the Trotters, and includes six feet, two inch Ermer Robinson, 14-year veteran with the team; J. C. Gipson, 6-8, veteran star and fun-maker; Norman Lee, 6-4; Jackie Fitz-

Stokes to See Royals Tussle

Cincinnati —UPI— Maurice Stokes will leave the hospital in a wheelchair Sunday afternoon to watch his old teammates, the Cincinnati Royals, play the Philadelphia Warriors.

Stokes, a star rebounder for the Royals until felled by a paralysis attributed to a brain injury, will be making his first trip outside a hospital in nearly two years.

It was on March 14, 1958, that Stokes fell unconscious on a plane after the Royals had lost to Detroit in a play-off game. He was taken by stretcher to St. Elizabeth Hospital at Covington, Ky., and later transferred to Christ hospital here.

University of Oregon, Eugene — Oregon's swimming and wrestling teams face rugged dual meet opponents this week end with Coach Don Van Russen's paddlers meeting Washington and Washington State in their first dual competition of the season while the wrestlers go against the Cougars in their match. Washington's swimmers come to the new Men's pool on Friday night at 7 p.m. and then Saturday the Duck swimmers and wrestlers board a chartered plane for Pullman for the meets with Washington State.

State Log Brand Act To Be Enforced Beginning Feb. 1

Salem — Enforcement of the state log brand act in western Oregon by the forest inspectors of the state forestry department will begin Feb. 1 in conjunction with the regular spring inspections, according to State Forester D. L. Phipps. The law, which was formerly administered by the public utilities commissioner, applies to anyone in western Oregon who transports logs by highways or railroads or who dumps logs into its waters, Phipps stated, and requires that each log be imprinted by the operator with a brand which is registered with the state forestry department at Salem.

Logging operators desiring to register brands may request applications by letter from the office of State Forester, Oregon state forestry department, Salem. The letter must contain the name under which the brand is to be registered, the address and a drawing of the proposed brand. This is essential in checking the acceptability of the brand which is, in turn, attached to the application that is sent to the operator in response to his request. The application, then, as it is filled out by the operator, requires an actual imprint of the brand from the finished hamper.

The size of the drawing that is included in the letter should not be less than two inches by two inches and be made up of not more than three symbols, or not more than one letter and two arabic numerals within a single form or outline. Should the brand requested not meet the requirements or found to be a duplication of a registered brand, suggestions will be made by the department for revisions that will make it acceptable and the request returned to the operator for approval.

Since there have been over 8500 log brands registered to some 6000 operators since this law became effective in 1943, the operator now applying has a problem in devising a brand which will not duplicate one of these already on file. A log brand directory has been published and is available for inspection at various state forestry, forest protective association and national forest headquarters in

selected areas throughout western Oregon. This directory should be consulted by the operator as he designs his own brand prior to writing for an application.

Distribution of the directory includes the following points: Cave Junction; Cave Guard station; Grants Pass, state headquarters office; Klamath Falls, Klamath FPA headquarters; Prospect, Prospect ranger station, and Medford, state headquarters office, Table Rock rd.

Standardized Symbols
Operators are encouraged to use a combination of standardized symbols as shown in the directory since this will facilitate their future location within the established system of filing. Odd brands are listed under miscellaneous and present a special problem of comparison with every new brand received.

A fee of \$5 is charged for registering the brand. Brand registration ends with every five-year period. Current registrations end Jan. 1, 1962 at which time a fee of five dollars will again be due. A similar fee is charged for transferring a brand.

Benson's Policies Would Hurt Income

Washington —UPI— A study prepared for the Senate Agriculture Committee shows that Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson's farm policies would cut 1965 net farm income 46 per cent below the 1958 level.

Committee Chairman Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) said Wednesday that the study indicated net income for some wheat farms might fall as much as 75 per cent below recent levels.

Ellender told the Senate that the basic figures were assembled at his request by Agriculture Department technicians.

The study was made to answer Ellender's request for a forecast on what would happen if practically all farm production controls were abolished and price supports reduced to free-market levels.
