Eugene—The Traveling Science Demonstration Lecture program of the University of Oregon will continue for its second year with another grant from the National Science Foundation.

The program of demonstration lectures is designed to stimulate the interest of high school students in science and scientific careers. The program from the University of Oregon will be available to many high schools throughout the six states of the northwest.

Heading the program this year at the university is E. G.

Ebbighausen, professor of physics. He has taken over as program director from Clarence E. Diebel, professor of science at Southern Oregon

mately a week at each school demonstrating experiments to science classes, exchanging ideas with the respective faculty heads in each school. This year there are 16 teachers traveling in six northwestern states.
