

Five Hoop Tiffs Taken By Hedrick

Hedrick Junior High school's eighth and ninth grade hoopsters each won their second game in two days on Saturday. The ninth downed the Klamath Falls Frosh 62 to 46 and the eighth won 32 to 25 in the afternoon action over its Klamath foe on the Hedrick basketball court. Hornet Danny Miles dropped in 14 field goals and two for four from the foul line to lead all scoring with 30 points.

In the ninth grade tussle, the Hornets led at all breaks 18-8, 37-16, and 47-34. Fred Kelly and Grover Dahm played outstanding ball for the Pelicans producing 23 points between them.

In the eighth grade game, the Hornets moved out to an early lead and then played reserves until late in the game when the starters came back in to thwart a Pelican rally. Marvin Yungt produced eight points for the losers while Steve Moore tallied seven for the Hornets.

Hornet teams swept three games at Ashland on Friday. The ninth was winner 49 to 44, the eighth 26 to 15 and the seventh 38 to 6.

Hedrick caught Ashland midway in the third period in the ninth grade mix and led 32 to 30 at the end of the panel. Ashland set up a good zone defense in the first half and headed 13 to 7 and 23 to 18 at the intermissions. The Hornets had trouble with the Grizzly zone. In the third frame Ashland lost some board strength when Hudson fouled out.

Tod Hess put in 16 points and Gale Tepper 14 for Ashland. Gib Mitchell topped Hedrick with 17.

Ashland led 6 to 5 at the quarter and 10 to 9 at the half in the eighth grade tangle. Hedrick took over 31 to 30 in the third period. Rich Knight scored eight points for the Hornets.

Doug Olson got 10 counters for the Hornets seventh which had 18 to 3 halftime spread.

Dick Ragsdale and Calvin Dean with 10 apiece and Lowell Dean with nine retrieves headed the Black Tornado in its board domination. Medford hopped off to 11 to 2 and 16 to 3 margins in the opening quarter and in the second stanza ran up 23-point gaps of 32 to 9 and 36 to 13. The Tornado collected 12 of its second period markers on gift tosses and Crater put in nine by the free heave means.

The Comets took advantage of a Medford lapse at the start of the third quarter and in 2 1/2 minutes time cracked the Tornado defense for four field while Medford was getting one. Crater cut its deficit to 12 points at 42 to 29. At this stage, Medford mentor Frank Roelandt sent a trio of reserves, Jim Barry, Calvin Dean and Booth Deakins. Their efforts helped stem the rally and the Tornado with 1 1/2 minutes remaining in the canto upped its spread to 20 points at 50 to 30.

Extend to 64-34
The Pear city gang then swished in six field baskets while holding the Comets without a counter in the first five minutes of the last period. That extended the score to 64 to 34.

Medford had 27 field goals and a 443 shooting average for the night and limited Crater to 10 and 217. Coach Lloyd Hoffine's Comets, however, led in free tosses with 24 of 32 to Medford's 18 of 30.

In rebounding the Black Tornado compiled a bulge of 50 to 26 after a 23 to 5 first half difference.

Crater high junior varsity thrashed a Medford sophomore crew 52 to 36 in the preliminary. Ron Beman and Jim Allen had 16 and 15 points, respectively, for the Comets.

Pender Given Nod In 'Title' Scrap

Boston—(UPI)—Paul Pender, the ex-fireman and boxing critic who won Sugar Ray Robinson's chunk of the world middleweight crown Friday night on an amazing upset decision, said today he is willing to give Ray a return shot at the title on April 1, if the fight is held in Boston.

Robinson, who claims the 90-day contract gives him the right to pick the site, insists that the bout be staged in New York. Although 39-year-old Robinson appeared off form, after 22 months of comparative inactivity, the once-great fighter from New York claims Friday night's 15-rounder was just what he needed to sharpen him for an April fight.

Fans Boo Lustily
Pender, of suburban Brookline, Mass., won a split decision after a fight that had so many dull moments that the 10,608 fans in the Boston Garden booed lustily in the middle rounds.

Pender, a former student of Brookline's Staley College who sometimes talks like a professor, suffered a cut at the corner of his left brow in the seventh round, but it was expected to be healed long before April 1.

The fight, which attracted a disappointing gate of \$85,010, made Robinson look like an old man of the ring nearing the end of his 20-year fistic trail. On at least two occasions he had the speedy 29-year-old Brookline boxer in serious trouble, but he lacked the stamina and accuracy to finish Pender.

Judges Favor Pender
Pender, a 5-1 underdog, used in-and-out tactics effectively enough to capture the votes of the two judges, although Referee Joe Zapusas favored Robinson.

Judge Joseph Santoro had the rangy, dark-haired Irish challenger ahead on a 10-points-must basis, 147-138, and Judge John Norton agreed, 148-142. Referee Zapusas favored Sugar Ray, 146-141, and a poll of 16 ringside sports writers favored Ray, 11-5.

Robinson, making his first defense since he recaptured the middleweight title from Carmen Basilio 22 months ago, tried desperately to knock out his lightly regarded challenger in the early rounds, but Pender was too fresh and fast to be nailed solidly. The National Boxing association vacated Ray's title
