Kenneth Denman, speaking for the Jackson county chapter of the Isaac Walton league, said by combining agencies the problems that now exist would not be solved, but "just put under one umbrella."

Denman said the chapter would favor a limited department of natural resources if it did not include the fish and game commissions and if it could first be proved to work more efficiently and economically than the separate agencies do now.

Rep. F. L. Bristol, Josephine county, told the committee he has found that most of the state's boards, commissions, and agencies are paying "their own way" and very often contributing to the support of other state functions as well.

Concerning the problem that the governor of Oregon has in trying to find good men for appointment to the state's boards and commissions, Bristol said he sympathized with the governor but nevertheless feels it is part of his job to find men of the necessary talent and experience who will serve well in these capacities.

Blame Unfortunate  
He said it is unfortunate that the governor is blamed for any mistakes made by these groups but does not feel that consolidation would be as successful as the present set-up.

Rep. Carl Back, Port Orford, asked several witnesses if they thought fishing on the Rogue river would have been better protected for both commercial and sport use, had there been an over-all authority to coordinate the policies of the various agencies that have tried to preserve fishing on the Rogue.

# Witnesses Oppose Combining Agencies

At the conclusion of Friday night's hearings, Senator Naterlin said in a statement that the state offices of the Isaac Walton league are favorable towards the idea of consolidating many of the agencies dealing with resources, but the committee was finding that many local officers oppose it.

Smith was asked by Rep. Bill Bradley, Gresham, if he knew why Oregon had 125 separate agencies and a state the size of New York has only 29.

He replied his chapter does not oppose consolidation of some agencies but does oppose combining the fish and game commissions and also the state water resources board with the state hydroelectric commission.

Rep. Pat Metke, Bend, asked Grover if he feels the people of Grants Pass are in favor of government economy at the expense of "temporary" conflicts in the combination of these agencies.

Metke pointed out that an estimated \$1 1/2 million is wasted each year in Oregon's government because of duplication of services and effort by the different agencies, a waste that might be prevented if an over-all authority would be put in charge of coordinating the various activities of these agencies.

Concerning the problem that the governor of Oregon has in trying to find good men for appointment to the state's boards and commissions, Bristol said he sympathized with the governor but nevertheless feels it is part of his job to find men of the necessary talent and experience who will serve well in these capacities.

Blame Unfortunate  
He said it is unfortunate that the governor is blamed for any mistakes made by these groups but does not feel that consolidation would be as successful as the present set-up.

Rep.
