It was only the second time in the history of the SEC that a team downed Kentucky twice in one basketball campaign. By United Press International Marshfield remained undefeated over the week end and is still rated as the number one high school basketball team in the state by the United Press International board of coaches. For the fourth week in a row the Pirates nabbed all eight first place votes for a perfect 80 points. But the Pirates will have to keep a close lookout for the number two team, Medford. The Black Tornado, winner of two games over the week end, grabbed off all eight second place votes and polled 72 votes. That's only eight behind Marshfield and the closest Medford has been this season. There was some shuffling around of teams in the remaining spots. Cleveland of Portland took over the number three spot, ousting North Bend which suffered its second defeat of the season over the week end. Cleveland barely edged out the Bulldogs with 56 points while North Bend polled 55 for fourth spot. Klamath Falls rounds out the top five with 44 points after being fourth last week. The remaining teams in order shaped up this way: Jefferson of Portland, Hermiton, La Grande, Springfield and South Salem. Springfield is the newcomer to the top 10 this week. The Millers polled 10 votes for ninth spot and sport an 8-4 win-loss mark. Hermiston, leader in the Inter-Mountain league, has the most wins of any team in the top 10 with 12. National League Sets Schedule

Cincinnati—UPI—The National league announced its 1960 schedule today with a record number of 312 night games, which can be largely credited or blamed—depending on how you look at it—on the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers. Every year at this time, the National league sets a record for the most night games ever scheduled. Last year the record was 296. The Dodgers are chiefly responsible for this year's new mark with an individual club record of 64 night games at home, including two twilight doubleheaders. The National league season officially will open on April 12, a week earlier than the American league, but both leagues will close on Oct. 2. Philadelphia opens at Cincinnati, Pittsburgh at Milwaukee, St. Louis at San Francisco and Chicago at Los Angeles at night. Philadelphia and Pittsburgh's home openers are slated for April 14. St. Louis' for April 19, and Chicago makes its first appearance at home on April 22. Dodgers Set Games Next to the Dodgers, who have only 13 day games scheduled at home, the Phillies will play the most night games at home, 52. The Cardinals are down for 48, the Braves 38, the Giants 23, and the Cubs will play all 77 of their home games during the day-time as usual. The Pirates have scheduled the most doubleheaders at home, seven. St. Louis has six, Philadelphia five, Milwaukee and Chicago four each, Cincinnati three, Los Angeles two, and San Francisco one. The first All-Star game will be played at Kansas City on Monday, July 11, and the second one is scheduled for New York two days later.
