

### Asian Flu Said Breaking Out Throughout U.S.

Washington, (Science Service)—Reports of more cases of Asian flu are pouring into the offices of the Public Health Service here.

Asian flu is breaking out simultaneously throughout the country, a U.S. PHS advisor told Science Service. The outbreak does not appear to be sweeping from east to west or north to south in any particular pattern, Dr. C. C. Dauer of the National Office of Vital Statistics said.

The so-called Q-flu reportedly affecting Los Angeles county will probably reveal itself to be none other than the Asian culprit, Dr. Dauer said. Early reports from the Pacific Coast stated that health officials there had termed the virus "Q-flu" because it had not been identified. The Q stands for question mark. The California Health department is now conducting tests to determine the identity of the virus, Dr. Dauer said.

**None in Europe**

Since there have been no reports of confirmed cases of influenza from Europe, PHS officials assume the virus now attacking Americans is "home-grown." To date, the health departments of Michigan, Texas and Hawaii have isolated the influenza virus from specific cases. California, Kentucky, Ohio, Wisconsin and Utah state health departments reported influenza-like illness among large groups of persons.

Persons who develop the symptoms suffer from sore throat, fever and aching. This outbreak comes as no surprise to PHS officials who last fall warned that Asian flu and other types of influenza could be expected this winter.

### Mathematics Can Be Fun, Speaker Says

"The role of the mathematician is to create new mathematics," said Dr. Stephen A. Jennings, mathematics professor at the University of British Columbia, "and there is a tremendous amount of new mathematics being created all the time."

Dr. Jennings today gave the first of five lectures scheduled at SOC this week. The public is invited to the remaining lectures, according to Dr. Floyd L. Taylor, chairman of the SOC mathematics department.

Dr. Jennings spoke again this morning and will speak Friday morning, afternoon and evening.

### Study Reveals Little Wheat Storage Loss

Manhattan, Kans., (Science Service) - Wheat may be stored for a considerable period of time with little loss from shrinkage and grade changes, a study of losses for more than 2.5 million bushels of wheat stored in 53 government bin sites in Kansas has shown. Results were reported by Ruth Clifton, agricultural economist at Kansas State university here. During a 24-month test period, losses averaged only \$1.25 for every 100 bushels, or 1.25 cents a bushel. For each 100 bushels, shrinkage amounted to \$1.11.
