The Medical Roundup

I remember once seeing a woman in her bed at home recovering from a bad cold. She said, "Oh, doctor, if only I could just lie here and sleep and rest for a week, perhaps I could get up and go to work again." But she was the only support for seven small children, and she just had to go out each day to work as a waitress. I don't know what would have happened to her if she hadn't had her old mother to help her.

I always admire a kind husband, who when he comes home, helps his overworked and ailing wife, perhaps to get dinner, and later to wash and wipe the dishes. I do not admire the man who sits down and refuses to help at all. Often he could save himself a lot of doctor bills and hospital bills by helping his wife a bit. The man may feel he has done his duty at the office, but still, he should help his wife.

Today, the mother of a number of children has too many jobs. She has to be a wife and companion and lover to her husband; she has to be a good mother to the children, also, a cook, a clothesmaker, a housekeeper, and often, to some extent, a teacher of the children. Oftentimes she has to help with the bread-winning. Nowadays, a mother with several teen-age children will spend much of her time each day taking them around in the car from one place to another: a daughter has to go to a dancing lesson; one boy has to go to baseball practice somewhere, another boy wants to go to the swimming pool, and in the evening a child wants to go to a dance, and wants to be brought back to two in the morning.

Unfortunately, fatigue tends to make people irritable, and that adds much to the strain of the busy day. A very tired mother may lose her temper and punish the children unnecessarily, and that will distress her. Then, when her husband comes home, she may snap at him. Often, also, the overworked mother gets too tired to sleep, and this brings a "vicious circle" as we doctors call it. The insomnia brings great fatigue, and great fatigue brings more insomnia. Then the woman may have to break into the "circle" by taking a sleeping tablet each night.

One of the best things a mother can do when she is about worn out is, each day for several weeks, to go back to bed after she has given her family their breakfast. Perhaps, also she can get a nap in the afternoon. A wise husband will keep assuring his wife that if she takes such rest, he will not think her lazy!

Kindness Pays In Inheritance

Detroit—UPI—Being kind to a "poor" old man led to a \$100,000 inheritance Tuesday for Carl W. Borge, a 47-year-old Great Lakes Steel Co. worker.

When Lewis William Armstrong, 71, died Sunday, he considered Borge, a neighbor, and the steelworker's family his only real friends. He hinted to the Borges that when he died they "would be surprised."

Borge said he never "dreamed" the old bachelor, a shipyard worker, had any money. Armstrong left another \$100,000 to the University of Michigan for a medical research foundation and \$1,000 to his church.

In his will, Armstrong listed his only relatives as "a bunch of cousins." He noted they were never too interested in him.

Borge and his family cared for the old man, cleaned his home and brought him his meals. Armstrong was said to have used his money to invest in real estate.

Crime Conference

To Hear Judge Langtry
Salem—UPI—Multnomah Circuit Judge Virgil Langtry will give the keynote address at the first Oregon state-wide conference on crime prevention here Feb. 16.

Parks Attendance Tops 10 Million

Salem—Oregon's state parks attendance again topped the 10 million mark during 1959. It has been reported by C. H. Armstrong, the highway commission's state parks superintendent.

The official figure of 10,290,961 showed an increase of 208,947 over the record breaking 1958 figure, Armstrong said.

"The real growth of interest in our parks is emphasized when the 1959 figure is contrasted with the 2,840,750 total attendance recorded just 10 years ago," Armstrong elaborated.

Yaquina Bay in Lincoln county retained its lead as the state's most popular park with 828,810 total visitor count for 1959.

Fort Stevens, near Astoria, one of the state's fastest growing spots for outdoor recreation, recorded 404,286 visitations, while Sunset Bay in Coos county was third with 341,445 and Rooster Rock, near Portland, recorded 335,737.

A record 517,061 campers made use of overnight facilities available to them at Oregon state parks in 1959.

Hoffa Urges Union To Oppose Backers

Washington—UPI—Teamsters President James Hoffa has urged the 1,600,000 members of his union to vote against any member of Congress who voted for the 1959 labor reform law.

Hoffa made the declaration in an article in the current issue of the teamsters monthly magazine issued Monday.

The labor reform bill received the votes of 352 House members and 95 senators. Most of the House members and many of the senators who backed the bill are running for reelection in November.
