

Senate Steps Up Work in Effort To Reach Decision on School Aid Bill

Washington—UPI—The Senate worked under a hurry-up timetable today on a federal school aid bill that would give states \$1 billion over the next two years to build classrooms.

Sen. Pat McNamara (D-Mich.), chief sponsor of the measure, said there was an "excellent chance" the senate would approve his bill.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) announced that the chamber would come to work early and remain in session late today and Thursday in an effort to complete action on the bill by early next week.

The lawmakers first must consider a series of proposed amendments. One would up the bill to \$2 billion. Another would authorize the government to guarantee half the debt service on long-term local school construction bonds.

The McNamara bill would provide \$500 million to the states in each of the next two

years. The states would have to put up matching funds based on state income and the number of children of school age.

Other congressional news: **Movies:** Gordon S. Finch Takes Stand; State Rests as Odds Mount for Defense

Los Angeles—UPI—Dr. R. Bernard Finch, a man who had a black-haired sun-tanned wife, a red-haired mistress and a \$750,000 fortune, was to tell today how he shot his wife to death.

The 42-year-old surgeon was scheduled to describe in court for the first time the events of July 18. He will testify following the opening statement of his defense lawyer, Grant Cooper.

Coed Arrested as Wayward Minor in Affair With Negro

New York—UPI—Blonde Dorothy Lebohrer, 18, a coed arrested as a wayward minor for trying to elope with a Negro basketball star, sent her lover home today "to finish your education so we can get married."

The pretty daughter of an official of Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., indicated that her parents' opposition to her plans to marry Warren Sutton, 20, had not changed her mind.

"I want to marry Warren as soon as possible," she told police after she was found holding hands with Sutton in a movie theater Tuesday night. "I intended to get married when I came down here."

To Finish Education

Dorothy embraced the 6-foot 4-inch athlete from Chester, Pa., shortly before she was taken into custody this morning by Alfred Police Chief Walter Rounds, and told him:

"Listen, honey, I want you to go home and finish your education so we can get married. I'm going to finish mine, and then I'll see you."

Dorothy's arrest by Rounds at an East Side precinct station was the latest move made by Mr. and Mrs. Edward K. Lebohrer to break up their daughter's romance of more than a year with Sutton. They had her adjudged a wayward minor once previously in order to foil an elopement.

The girl disappeared early Tuesday morning from a room adjoining that of her parents at the Hotel Biltmore. She said she had gone along with her mother's plans to take her to Florida to forget Sutton, but had secretly made arrangements to meet him during a stopover in New York.

ing. In New York State, any person between the ages of 16 and 21 can be adjudged a wayward minor and placed in parental custody if they are wilfully disobedient to the lawful commands of their parents and are "morally depraved or in danger of becoming morally depraved."

Lebohrer, treasurer of Alfred University, said he and his wife were sick about the romance because "mixed marriages have an almost impossible chance of succeeding."

"Young people have been taught that this is one world, and the idea has caught on," he commented. "Many of Dorothy's young friends simply can't understand our opposition to her marriage to Sutton."

Her parents had opposed her romance with Sutton but had been unsuccessful in keeping them apart. Dorothy told them she was with Sutton for a week over Christmas holidays while she was thought to be visiting a girl friend in Newark, N.J.

Applying Points Out Savings Effected in State Government

Salem—UPI—Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. predicted today economics in his department will save "at least \$235,000 during the 1959-61 biennium."

He said the "rigid economy program" is the "clear demand of the taxpayers for all possible economy in government."

In making public the savings, Appling said "this points up the need for increased cooperation between the various departments of government."

Natural Tendency

"There is a natural tendency for each to consider themselves an empire unto themselves. We can save a lot of money and eliminate needless duplication by sharing staff and equipment, and we have made a good start in that direction."

His five-page report said principal savings were made by eliminating about 30 full time positions, by a 60 per cent cutback in capital expenditures and by reduction in cost of various materials and services approaching \$100,000.

Appling said by reducing the number of employees in his department, expenditures for salaries and wages will be reduced some \$146,000.

Most reductions were accomplished by retirement or transfer to other state agencies to fill vacancies, he said.

Out-of-state travel in the secretary's department has been cut "to only that required by law."

"I was aghast," he said, "to learn how much of the taxpayer's money is spent on out-of-state travel. We have curtailed it, and I hope other departments will follow suit where possible."

Appling added he would "soon" make specific recommendations for additional savings requiring action of the Legislature.
