**Dow Chemical Picks Plant Site**  
San Francisco—Dow Chemical Co. announced Thursday that Kalama, Wash., has been selected as the site for a phenol plant. Leland A. Doan, general manager of Dow's Western division, said land fill operations would begin next month on a 150-acre site on the Columbia river, about 30 miles north of Vancouver, Wash. He said it was expected the plant would be completed in 1961. Other sites that were considered were Portland, Ore.; Tacoma, Wash., and St. Helens, Ore. Ed Hendrickson, port manager for Kalama, said his city was picked because of the Washington tax structure, because of three-railroad service to Kalama and because of a public relations campaign put on by officials of the Washington city.

# Medford Council Authorizes Plans For Street Paving

The Medford city council last night authorized preliminary plans and specifications for paving on three city streets.

The council authorized plans for paving Black Oak dr. from Barnett rd. to Juanipero Way and noted that 100 per cent of the property owners affected had signed a petition requesting it.

Plans also were authorized for paving Niantic st. from Edwards to Maple sts., where some 53.2 per cent of the property owners had signed the petition.

It had earlier been estimated that 65 per cent had signed the petition, but the earlier figure was found to be in error.

The third street for which plans and specifications were approved is Country Club dr. from Sutter st. 320 feet west, for which 100 per cent of the owners affected had signed a petition.

Plans and specifications for a storm sewer on Stevens st. and Crater Lake ave., were approved by the council. This project will cost an estimated \$6,000 and will reportedly eliminate the open ditch between Stevens st. and Crater Lake ave.

City Manager Robert Duff reported on a traffic survey on Keene Way and Oregon ave., which is underway by the traffic engineering and police departments.

This study is not yet complete, Duff said, but it appears that one of the main safety problems at this location is that there are no sidewalks and children must walk on the roadside to and from school.

An application for a liquor license from The Oregon Food Stores Inc., 523 South Central ave., was approved by the council.

Assessments for the Kenwood-Grandview and Berrydale sewer projects were segregated by the council, and a five-year extension of an agricultural lease at the airport was approved.

Councilman R. L. Van Sickle asked that the city look into the problem created by several cars which are parked on blocks in an area in Ward 3 and which he and some of the residents deem unsightly and hazardous.
