

New Rules for Road Use Noted

New regulations will relieve private companies from paying road use fees on roads they build across bureau of land management's western Oregon forest lands, the department of interior has announced.

Under the old rules, if a private operator built a logging road across O and C lands to reach and haul out timber he owned and he received a short-term permit from the government, the road became government property when the permit expired.

Unless the government were maintaining the road, the operator would not pay any fee while his permit was in effect, BLM Director Edward Wozzley explained.

Under the new rules, if the same operator again wanted to use that same road, after his permit expired, he would not be required to pay a road fee, Wozzley said.

He would, however, continue to pay his proportionate share of the maintenance costs of the road, along with his share of any improvements added to the road by the government since the operator first built and used it.

Under the old rules, the operator had to pay a road use fee based on his fair share of the total road construction and maintenance costs. Actually, the operator used to repay the government for his own initial investment, Wozzley explained.

Senator Against Blocking Unander

Portland - (UP) - Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Friday he hoped Sen. Ernest Gruening (D-Alaska) would not attempt to block the appointment of ex-Oregon State Treasurer Sig Unander to the Federal Maritime Board.

Grueing Thursday charged that Unander was not a "fit member" to sit on the Board, saying the Oregonian "prejudged" a freight rate case involving Alaska. He made the accusation at a Senate Commerce committee hearing on Unander's nomination.

Neuberger, recuperating at home after two bouts with the flu, wired Gruening that he fully sympathized "with your indignation over constantly increasing freight rates to Alaska."

"However," Neuberger added, "it is my earnest hope that you will not oppose Senate confirmation . . . because of this long-standing practice of the Board which precedes by many decades Mr. Unander's appointment."

Bristol Silica Plant to Be Sold

Rogue River - The present Bristol Silica plant at Rogue River will be sold with its equipment Feb. 23 by the Oregon State Highway commission, it was announced.

To be sold are crushers, roller mills, shakers, separators, vibrating screens, dust collectors, tumbler dryer, water pump, metal frame shop building, office building and other miscellaneous items.

The plant is being rebuilt about a mile west of Rock Point bridge where an S curve crosses the Southern Pacific tracks.

The commission, which is selling the plant equipment before razing the building, will open the building for inspection at 8 a.m. Feb. 23 before the sale starting at 1 p.m.

Sen. Richard Neuberger's office here said the money is earmarked for the communities of Astoria, Astoria, Dallas, Empire, Klamath Falls, North Bend, The Dalles, Pendleton and Reedsport.

The federal grant will be matched by equal state and local funds.

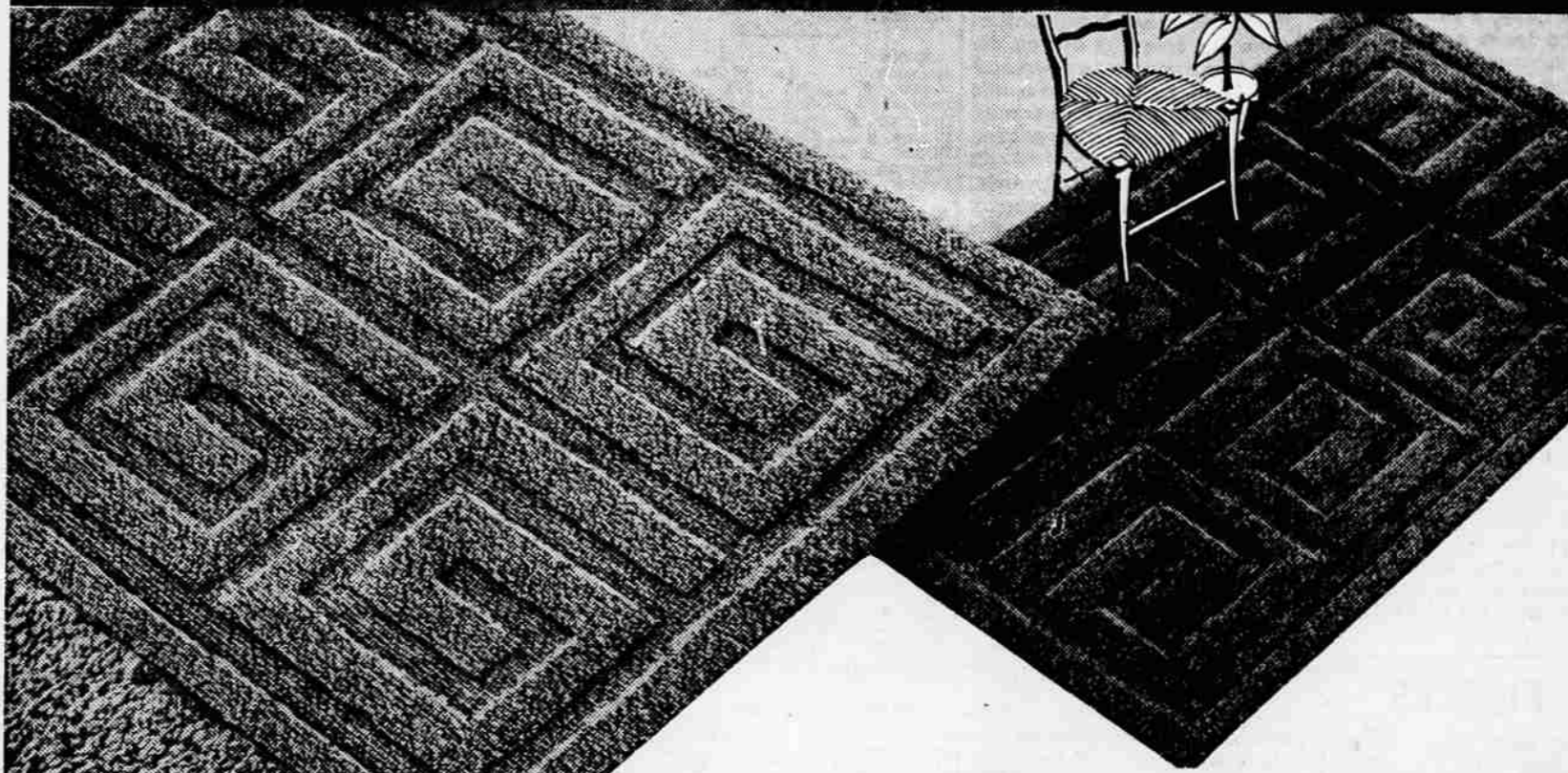
