

Dr. Judd Discusses Problems Of Republican Party, Nation

Dr. Walter Judd, Republican congressman from Minnesota, laid the problems of the nation, world and Republican party on the operating table during Friday's luncheon meeting of the Abraham Lincoln club here, diagnosed them and recommended cures and treatment.

Speaking before approximately 300 persons, both Democrats and Republicans, jammed into the Jackson hotel dining room, Dr. Judd moved from his problem diagnosis, figuratively grabbed Abraham Lincoln's rail-splitting ax and hacked away at "misconceptions" of the Republican party. These, he indicated, were fostered by the Democrats.

Noting that Friday was the 151st anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birthday, Dr. Judd remarked that the American Civil War president wore out his heart trying to solve the nation's problems. He realized that the nation could not exist half slave and half free.

Faced With Problem
"Today we are faced with the same problem, only now it isn't a question of chattel slavery but one of human slavery," the congressman said, jabbing at Russia. "There are 900 million people now in slavery. The Republican party must provide the leadership to solve the problem."

"We have the uneasy feeling that Korea now half slave and half free will not remain so indefinitely. It will be either all slave or all free," Judd emphasized. "The same applies to China, Germany and this planet. If this world does not become all free we may see the United States overcome by the Communists within our lifetime!"

The congressman took broad swipes at proposals for trade with Red China, a proposal fostered by Congressman Charles Porter (D-Ore.).

Communists are not capitalists so they cannot conduct trade as a capitalist United States thinks of it, he said, adding that trading with the Red Chinese would be the same thing as the exportation of scrap iron to Japan which used it for conquest.

The doctor noted he had picked much of this same scrap iron out of the bodies of Chinese men, women and children when he was a medical missionary during the China-Japan war. One such piece was clearly stamped made in Erie, Pa., he said.

Asks Question
"Why should we recognize Communist China, strengthen her through trade and thus weaken the position of our friends?" the congressman queried. "The Communists have bragged that when it comes time to hang the West the Communists will use the cupidity of the capitalists to get them to bid on the rope."

"People say how can we deal with the Chinese Communists unless we recognize them and allow them in the United Nations? How are we going to deal with 'em once they are in?" the slight little doctor said with a toss of his arms Heavenward. "It's like the woman who marries the brute to reform him. Once married she loses her bargaining power."

"Then people say if we shouldn't permit Red China in why not kick the Russians out? They haven't read the UN charter. Under the charter, they have the power of veto on this proposal."

"You can't get into the University of Oregon, where

I'll speak tonight, unless you qualify. Why should the Chinese Communists be allowed in the UN unless they qualify by proving they will further the peaceful aims of the UN?"

The people of India received the shock treatment on Red China's aims, the physician-congressman remarked. The Indians fear what the United States will not do and what the Reds will do. Recognizing Red China and allowing it to establish embassies in the United States will allow them to maintain centers for intrigue, espionage and sabotage in this country, Congressman Judd argued.

Pondering on political and scientific developments, the congressman remarked that the United States is not so far behind Russia "as the apologists of doom and gloom" state. Overall, the United States is far ahead, he pointed out.

Eisenhower's personal visits to foreign countries electrified the people because they suddenly realized that the United States "does care." The United States had been giving the countries the material benefits "without making love." Russia is doing just the reverse.

Returns From Trip
Judd added that he recently returned from an Asian visit and learned the Chinese "have the finest troops in the world

on Formosa ready for action in any part of Asia. They have been trained under enemy barrages and are not afraid of fire."

Moving on to national and party problems, Dr. Judd declared, "Politics determines government and government is the most powerful force in your life. It determines what happens to your children, business and freedoms."

He urged everyone to actively work in politics "since no work is more important, not even your own business." Limited government, as favored by the Republicans, must be practiced. This, he explained, is "from the bottom up" government as set forth in the U.S. Constitution. "As Abraham Lincoln knew, government of and by the people will be for the people," the congressman declared.

The Bill of Rights being

taught to high school students with a liberal viewpoint was founded by Alexander Hamilton, a conservative. They provide for equal opportunities, not for equal rewards, the congressman pointed out.

Keep People Alive
"We doctors are keeping the people alive longer, only to have their savings and pensions dwindle through devaluation of the dollar," the congressman - physician remarked.

The Republican party is not the party of the rich versus the poor, or of big business alone, it represents all of the people, he said. Everybody depends on big business directly or indirectly for their living, Dr. Judd pointed out.

The nation voted "in hope" when Eisenhower was elected president since he was an unknown as to political potential, Judd remarked.

However, the nation knows what Nixon will do if elected as president, since he has continuously been before the public eye, closely associated with the president and thoroughly investigated, the congressman pointed out.

State Commission To Select Students

The state scholarship commission is now preparing to select scholarship students for 1960-61, according to Bob Lemon, state scholarship chairman, Corvallis.

Those students who have been recommended for scholarships through their high schools to the college or university to which he wants to go, it was explained.

"While the law places with the commission the responsibility for making selections each member of the legislature is cordially invited to make a nomination from his district," the commission chairman said. "The commission will give such recommendations the most careful consideration."

All nominations should be forwarded to the commission chairman, 120 Country Club way, Corvallis, not later than March 1, it was pointed out.

A scholarship now held by a student in college will be renewed automatically if minimum requirements have been fulfilled the chairman said.

'Join Now' Program Noted by Marines

A "join now, go later" program has been announced by the U.S. Marine corps, according to M/Sgt. Bill Rayner of the Medford Substation, room 200, post office building.

Men between the ages of 17 and 28 are eligible under the new program. They may enlist now and return home to

complete education or employment. Enlistees are called to active duty 120 days from date of enlistment, or may go on any date of their choice in between.

Sergeant Rayner said the program assures acceptance before graduation from school or quitting a job, more pay when assigned to active duty.

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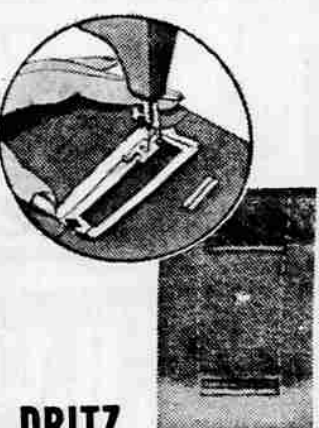
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Gold Hill Library Lists Developments
