Dr. Mayfield described the Russian school system and displayed an English-printed form of a Modern History textbook and a daily report book used to record each pupil's progress. Dr. Mayfield also exhibited a Russian newspaper, a variety of medals such as those worn by all ages of the people, and his Russian caracul hat.
