Reports Given by Planning, Tree and Budget Committees

Editor's note: This is the third in a series of articles describing the purposes, 1959 accomplishments and 1960 plans of Medford's 17 departments, boards and commissions as they were reported at the city's Living Annual Report banquet last week. This article gives an account of the reports of the planning commission, street tree committee and citizen's budget committee.

PLANNING COMMISSION
"The wrong city planning today will cause city disorder in the future," stated Paul Selby, chairman of the city planning commission.

To prevent future disorder, the planning commission is charged with the general administration of the city's ordinances relating to planning and with conducting long-range planning for the development of the community, Selby reported.

He said that most of the commission's time in 1959 was devoted to the administrative aspects of planning, but they also considered the long-range problems of the city and have contracted with the University of Oregon for a series of basic planning studies which will lead to a comprehensive plan for Medford.

In 1959 the commission recommended to the city council an ordinance regulating the subdivision of land, which the council adopted, Selby said.

The commission has received and reviewed a preliminary land use plan for northern Medford, a land-use survey and analysis of the Medford urban area, a study of population distribution and trends in the urban area, and a report relating to the present zoning ordinance and some suggestions relative to a new zoning ordinance.

Considered Requests
In the past year, the commission considered and acted upon 27 requests for change of zone, 12 requests for variances to the zoning ordinance, seven requests for street or alley vacations, 12 subdivisions and five petitions for annexation to the city.

In addition to the actual decision process of administration, the commission has had or now has under study various problems related to planning administration, he pointed out.

These problems include a revision to the multiple family section of the zoning ordinance, wrecking yards within the city, a new ordinance regulating trailer parks, an explanatory brochure regarding subdivision procedures, and a study of land use at freeway interchanges.

At the present time the commission is in the process of developing a generalized land use plan for the Medford urban area, a park plan, a zoning ordinance and zoning map for the city.

Selby said it is expected that these projects will be completed some time this summer.

He added that once these basic planning studies have been completed, the commission can then direct its attention to more specific and detailed problems within the city.

Full-Time Staff
The commission will recommend in the next budget that the city consider employing a full-time director and staff for the planning department, Selby said.

For the past two years, the city has been using the "excellent" services of Ned Langford for the duties of planning director. Langford is actually employed by the bureau of municipal research at the University of Oregon, Selby explained, and is in Medford for the performance

of specific duties for the bureau.

A list of the projects which are envisioned for work in the near future include, he said, such things as a refinement of the residential section of the land use plan, a study of the central area of the city, a public buildings study, a capital improvements study and a study of possibilities of urban renewal.

These studies will be built upon the general planning policies developed by the commission and the city council in the process of the preparation of the generalized land use plan and the zoning ordinance, Selby pointed out.

Other commission members are Jack Edson, Donald Walters, Larry Schade, Elwood Hedberg, Charles Cray and Harold Snodgrass.

STREET TREE COMMITTEE
The Medford street tree committee is dedicated to the development of a practical, professionally planned, beautification program for the city of Medford.

This program consists of carefully selecting and planting trees on streets presently not having them, replacing existing trees which have to be removed and preserving existing trees wherever possible, Mrs. Edith Edson, committee chairman, reported.

"By regulating spacing and guiding planting, the end result will be lovely avenues of trees, whose tops stay out of wires; whose roots stay out of sewers; and whose growth does not raise sidewalk," Mrs. Edson stated.

The committee was appointed four years ago for the purpose of developing a plan necessary for the operation of the city's street tree ordinance.

Tree Selection
The selection and spacing of trees is the responsibility of the landscape section, consisting of three landscape architects, the county horticultural agent and a former member of the garden club, she explained, and added that much time is devoted to the selection of proper trees for certain streets.

She said that the promotion section of the committee promotes the purchase and planting of specified trees by individual property owners. This is done, she said, by organizing and assisting neighborhood groups to carry the plan to completion.

Maps have been prepared by a draftsman, she pointed out, which locate each tree on all city property in Medford with a record as to specimen, size and condition.

The maps will be used by the city in the administration of the plan, thus insuring its continuation through the years, she said.

A few new streets were completely planted in 1959 and several others were started, she said.

Since the plan was started, nearly 1,000 new trees have been added to the city streets.

"The outlook for 1960," Mrs. Edson reported, "is to plan and plant more streets and continue the progress of a program that will one day make Medford known for its pleasant streets and beautiful trees."

Other committee members besides Mrs. Edson are Mrs. Fred Lorish, Clifford Cordy, Chester Corry, Mrs. Minnie Ball, Paul Jorgensen, Bob Johnson and Mrs. Wilbur Tucker.

CITIZENS BUDGET COMMITTEE
State law requires every incorporated city in Oregon to have a citizen's budget committee and sets forth its duties within fairly large limitations.

Tom Rickard, acting chairman of the budget committee, reported that the committee consists of registered voters and freeholders who are ap-

pointed for three year terms in equal number to the number of members on the city council. Council members also serve on the budget committee.

The committee has a definite time schedule as the law requires advertising of the budget, a public hearing and separate council action on the budget, all before July 1, he said.

Access to Records
Rickard explained that the committee has access to all city financial records and can call before it any city employee for the purpose of acquiring information necessary to prepare the budget.

The view of the budget committee is a broad one, he said. They do not feel it is their purpose to question such items as need for new typewriters, but consider what services Medford should render its citizens and to what extent.

They also delve into a comparison of Medford with cities of like populations and problems, he added.

He said that last year's budget committee was presented a challenge by its chairman—to stay under the maximum 6 per cent tax increase limitation.

Rickard said that by examining each item carefully the budget remained under the maximum, but the committee was reminded that some city employees had not received a pay increase for some time.

The raises were granted, Rickard added, and the committee ended with a net savings to the citizens of \$80, but even this can be considered a record.

City Expanded
Some of the problems facing the committee for the 1960-61 budget are serious and complex, he pointed out. The city has expanded rapidly over the past several years and the new areas must receive the same services enjoyed by the older ones.

Services
This creates problems, the chairman explained, because some of the newer areas do not yet have a tax base that will support their share of the services. The committee will have to decide whether it is best to expand the services or spread thin what personnel and equipment the city now has.

For the budget group, as with all financial planning committees, inflation is a serious factor, he added. Employee salary scales are mainly affected, Rickard said, and the committee will have to look into problems.

One idea that the budget committee will examine is the possibility of having the city departments share personnel.

Rickard concluded by saying, "The 1960-61 budget committee will consider how to disperse over \$3 million of the citizens' money to give them the services they want in the best possible way."
