Venerable Disease

Many people wonder what the several venerable diseases are. I find even some men

who confuse syphilis with gonorrhea, and who do not know how very different the two diseases are. The worst venerable disease is syphilis. The infection can attack a youth and then smolder in his body until — when he is 50 or 60 — it can severely injure his nervous system, or one of his big arteries. It can produce the very painful "locomotor ataxia," or insanity, with delusions of grandeur, or progressive paralysis; or it can produce what is known as an aneurysm, a blow-out in an artery. Not all such blowouts are due to syphilis; some are due to ulceration in the wall of the artery.

Syphilis sometimes begins with an ulcer on the private parts, and sometimes, six weeks later, the person has a measles-like rash, together, probably, with enlarged lymph glands. In many cases, there is no history of a local sore (chancre). Today, most persons with syphilis can have their disease arrested or cured with the help of large doses of penicillin. After such treatment, they are not likely to pass the contagion on to someone else.

Blood Tests Help
Syphilis is due to a tiny spiral organism, called a spirochete. The disease can generally be recognized with the help of any one of several blood tests. The original one is called the Wasserman test. In many states a couple are not allowed to marry until they have had such tests made. The reason for this is that years ago, before treatment of the disease was greatly improved, quite a few children were born with it. Today we doctors do not see as many children with congenital syphilis as we used to. Now we are much more likely to see healthy children born to a father with perhaps a positive Wasserman test.

Fortunately, he did not marry until he had had enough treatment to render his disease non-contagious. Because of this he did not infect his wife, and hence his children did not get the disease. It isn't always possible to say why his blood is "Wassermann-fast" (No amount of treatment will change his Wasserman test from positive to negative.) Usually today, I think experts on syphilis tell a thoroughly treated Wasserman-fast man of 60 to stop taking treatments, if for 30 years or more he has had no symptoms of the disease, and if his spinal fluid is normal.

Rarely one sees a person with positive blood tests for syphilis but no history of any symptoms or signs of the disease, and perhaps no history of sexual promiscuity. Fortunately, today, experts have a test so "specific" that it is likely to settle all doubts that may have remained in the minds of the patient's physicians. It may satisfy everyone that the person never had syphilis.

Bitter Cold Halts Search for Coors

Golden, Colo. — Wet snow followed by bitter cold abruptly halted the search for Adolph Coors III today, but officers and FBI agents continued sifting meager clues.

Two theories began to develop over the week end as to the fate of the wealthy 44-year-old executive.

One was the possibility he had been abducted by professional criminals who overwhelmed him at a narrow bridge across Turkey creek Tuesday and spirited him away.

The other was the possibility Coors might have been waylaid at the bridge by a young thief seeking a fast dollar and through violence became enmeshed in an operation "too hot" for him to leave as a holdup.

Armless Boy Held In School Fires

Santa Monica, Calif. — A 14-year-old boy born without arms was held today on charges of helping set 21 fires in two school buildings.

The youth, along with a 15-year-old boy, admitted setting the fires over the holiday weekend in John Adams Junior High School, causing \$8,000 damage. Their names were withheld because of their ages.

The armless youth, who "has just a finger growing out of the right side of his body, gripped the matches against the side of his body with the finger and struck them," according to Police Chief C. R. Hansen.

He said the boys started fires in various rooms of the school because they didn't like their teachers or the school. They were held on suspicion of felonious arson.

Alert 'Pioneers' Take on Supplies

Los Angeles — The 100-foot former refrigerator ship Alert was loaded with supplies today for a planned trip which will take a handful of modern-day pioneers to a new home on the Galapagos islands.

The group hopes to have its vessel fully loaded and ready to travel in two weeks.

The Alert arrived in Los Angeles harbor Saturday after a storm-tossed trip from Coos Bay, Ore. Thirteen of the pioneers made up her crew with their wives and children coming here by land.

The adventurers set out from Seattle originally and put in at Coos Bay for repairs after getting caught in a storm.

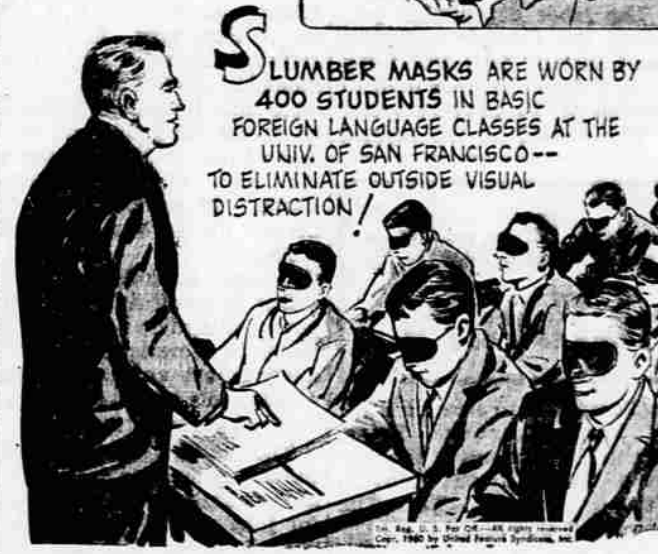
