Top-rated California surged closer to the big five title today and that golden spot in the NCAA basketball tournament where the Bears will defend the title they won last year.

Coach Pete Newell's Warriors swept a pair last week end from Southern California, 57-46 and UCLA, 53-45, to move a game and a half ahead of the Bruins.

With only four conference games left, Cal to all intents and purposes has the big five championship wrapped up.

In other key Saturday action, Stanford downed Southern California, 66-51, to hand the Trojans their sixth loss in nine games. Loyola defeated San Jose State, 51-42, and to keep its West Coast Athletic conference hopes alive.

Red Raiders Sweep OCE Court Series

Stubborn Eastern Oregon college put a crimp in Oregon Tech's Oregon Collegiate conference title hopes Saturday night with a 68-66 victory. It was the second win in a row for the Mountainers over league-leading OTI.

Southern Oregon got past Oregon College 83-71 Saturday night.

Oregon Tech now is 8-5 compared to 6-4 for Portland State. Southern Oregon has a 7-6 record, EOC is 4-6 and OCE is 2-8.

Ashland - Oregon college had the leading scorer in Ron Jones with 35 points and the leading rebounder in Al Harter with 19 snafes but Southern Oregon had its five basketball starters hit in the doubles figures to trounce OCE 83-71 here Saturday night in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

Gordon Carrigan paved the way for the second night in a row with 22 points which

ran his total to 60 points for the two-game series.

Dick Smith followed Carrigan with 17, Dave Gardner had 14, Brad Flannery 11, and John Payne pumped in 10 to help the Raiders maintain a hold on third place in the conference.

Oregon College made a ball game of it from the middle of the first half until the last 10 minutes of the second half but only four of its players tallied field shots and one of those got only one and another three. Jones led the way with 16 but it was not enough to cope with the Raider team effort.

In the first half the lead saw-sawed 12 times and the score was knotted seven times before OCE's Wolves took a slim one-point lead at the intermission 41-40.

Things started off rough for the Raiders in the second half. They faded to a 51-44 deficit with four minutes gone.

It took the men of SOC eight minutes of nipping at the heels of the Wolves before Carrigan tossed in a long two-hander and Glen Peterson squirreled under to give the Raiders a 69-67 edge. They kept the lead from there.

In the final five one-half minutes the Raiders pumped in 16 points while OCE could manage only four.

It was SOC's double win over any team this year.

The Raiders shot 51.5 per cent from the field. OCE hit 42.6 per cent.

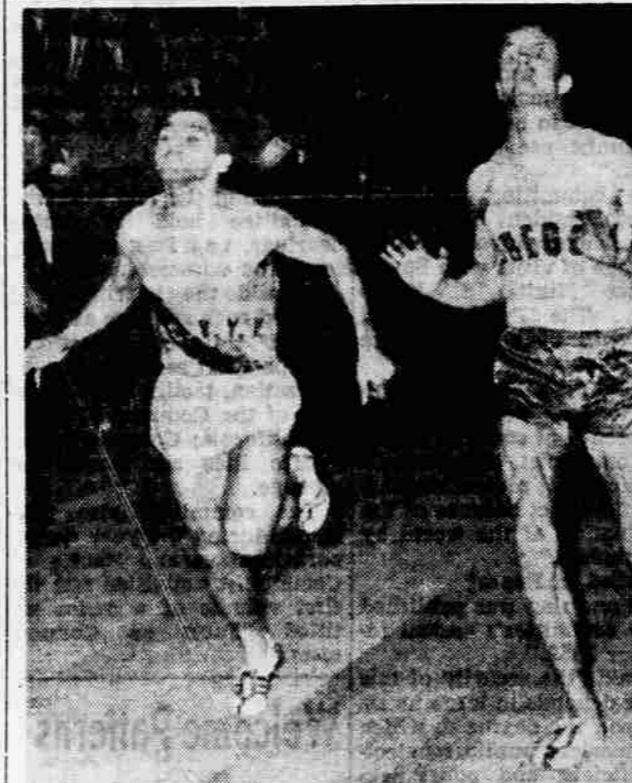

Ohio State Near Toga

Ohio State can clinch a tie for the Big 10 title tonight and continue its march toward the first unbeaten conference championship in 17 years.

The Buckeyes moved another step toward the crown Saturday night when they routed Iowa, 75-47, for their ninth consecutive conference triumph. Ohio State thus shared the Saturday night spotlight with New York University, which upset sixth-ranked Villanova, 62-50.

NYU's triumph - only two days after St. John's upset of fifth-ranked West Virginia - sent New York City's basketball prestige soaring to perhaps its highest level in a decade. NYU already has accepted a bid to the NCAA tournament and St. John's is expected to take a bid to the National Invitation Tournament.

No Big 10 team has gone unbeaten since the 1943 Illinois Whiz Kids, but Ohio State is a good bet to turn the trick.

Cook Equals Record in 60 Sprint

Oregon's touring track stars were back home today, one with a world record tie in his pocket and another trying to figure out his mistake as he suffered the second defeat of his mile career.

Roscoe Cook, who last summer equalled the world record in the 100-yard dash, Saturday night ran the 60-yard dash in six seconds, flat in Los Angeles Times games. That six seconds equalled the record in that event which was set by Herb Carper in Dorismund, Germany, Feb. 28 last year.

The other runner, miler Dyrrol Burleson, lost the Baxter mile in New York's AC games in Madison Square Garden. Burleson lost the race to Jim Beatty, former North Carolina miler, by the closest of margins. Burleson and Beatty were timed in the exact clockings of 4:05.4 but Beatty was ruled to have crossed the finish line first.

Vic Reeve, also competing in the New York mile, was clocked in 4:11.4 which was good enough for third in the field.

Jim Grelle, former Oregon distance star, won the 1,000-yard run in the Los Angeles event in the time of 2:13.4.

Another former Oregon distance star, Bill Dellinger, placed second in the Los Angeles mile with a time of 4:09.4.

Two Oregon State track men entered in the New York games didn't fare too well. Steve Pauly failed to qualify for the finals in the hurdles placing fourth in his heat. Darrell Horn placed fourth in the 60-yard dash and also didn't qualify for the finals.

Tornado Defeats GP For 12th SO Verdict

Medford's Black Tornado applied its last break to shatter the Caveman threat in a high-powered second quarter assault and rambled on to a 77 to 53 triumph over Grants Pass high Saturday night in Southern Oregon conference basketball.

With 12 victories and no losses now at the three-fourths mark of the District 6 A-1 campaign, the Tornado is within range of reclaiming the conference banner it last held in 1956. Medford can wrap up the pennant by winning two of its remaining four games or simply by bopping second place Klamath Falls next Saturday on the Pelican court.

Tornado cagers were enabled by free shots to have an 18 to 16 edge on GP at the quarter Saturday evening. They went well out in front with a second panel barrage from the field, leading 39 to 24 at the half. And in the third canto, helped again by frequent jaunts to the gift heave line, they stretched to a margin of 21 points at 60 to 39. Medford's most sizable bulge was 28 points, 75 to 47, Anderson 12 of 13.

Jerry Anderson, with 12 tallies on 13 chances at the free stripe, was Medford's major point maker with 26. Four players had 11 counters, Bob McKinire and Ken Durkee of Medford and Rex Benner and Dan McIntire of Grants Pass. Benner was the game's top rebounder with 14 snafes while McKinire had 12 and Anderson 10.

Grants Pass, livened by McIntire's four field buckets, three on drives, seemed in the first quarter bent on making the fracas a torrid one. But the Black Tornado broke an 8-0 knot on pairs of free throws by Anderson and Jerry Shults that gave Medford a lead it never gave up.

Then in the second stanza, Shults countered for Medford on a fast break off a Dick Ragsdale rebound, Anderson hit a pusher from the side, Ken Durkee drove about the length of the court for a shot, McKinire hit from the side on a fast break and Ragsdale scored on another sizzling surge down the court. In the meantime, Benner had put in a single bucket for the Cavemen and Medford led 28 to 18 with just over three minutes played in the quarter. Another five field goals and a single free toss added up to 21 Tornado markers for the chucker while Grants Pass produced just eight. Medford gunned at .714 from the field in the session.

27 Free Tosses
The Tornadoes with 27 free counters in the hassle, 10 of them in the first period, collected nine gifters in the third quarter. They added these to another six field buckets and again piled up 21 points in an eight minute span.

Medford made the route complete by time and again breaking up the Caveman offensive efforts in the fourth panel. And, the Tornado spread would have been much

wider but for some erratic passing and misfired shots.

Some fine team play again went into the Medford victory but it was fortunate in getting the free shot boost early in the game. The Tornado was cold from the field in the starting quarter, making only four of its 19 shots go in. After the sizzling second panel, the Medford field shooting fell off to average accuracy.

GP Jayvees Win
Grants Pass junior varsity behind 20 to 29 at the half and 31 to 39 as late as the fourth quarter surged up in the final minutes to nose out the Medford jayvees 43 to 42 in a preliminary game at the Hedrick gym. Medford won the sophomore scrap 55 to 24 on the senior high court.

Steve Ausland put in the winning bucket for the Caveman jayvees with just over 1 1/2 minutes to play. Larry Hammack, Bob McIntire and Jerry Gastineau all missed free throws for Medford in the last minute of the game. A couple of Medford field tries also failed to find the range. Jim Blacksmith had 20 points for GP and Bruce Bray nine for Medford. The junior Tornado missed 18 free toss tries.

Chuck Allen tallied 15 for the Medford sophs and Vic Van Koten put in nine counters for GP.

Yankees Rate Well Back On Downhill Racing List

Squaw Valley, Calif. -UPI- The official "grouping" for all important starting places in the men's and women's downhill races of the Olympic Games were announced today.

But the others were right on his trail. Several Finns and Norwegians each bettered the old officially recognized mark for this jump of 88 1/2 meters.

And indications are that the United States feminine racers will be in the thick of the battle for gold medals. But the men aren't given a chance to finish in the first 20.

On the women's team, Penny Pitou of Lanconida, N.H., is rated fourth in the international rankings and Betsy Snite, Norwich, Vt., is listed seventh.

The ratings are set by the International Ski Federation and are based on points scored in major meets. Because the course gets cut up late in the competition, the best spots for competitors is the first "unit" of 12 in the women's and 15 in the men's.

But no American men were listed in the first unit for the males. Highest rated is Gordon Eaton, Littleton, Vt., and he is 'way down in 24th place.

Pia Riva of Italy topped the women's ratings, Carl Schranz of Austria, the men's U.S. Hockey Team Wins.

The valley got another beautiful, sunny Sunday and the athletes got in excellent workouts on all venues.

In the ski jumping, the Germans, Finns and Norwegians

tried to out-do themselves again. For the second straight day, Germany's young Helmut Recknagel led the way with two leaps of 91 meters-about 295 feet.

Richmond, England (UPI) - Pete Dawkins, former All-American at West Point, may be forced to cancel his athletic activities at Oxford University for several weeks.

Dawkins, at Oxford on a Rhodes scholarship, suffered a possible jaw fracture Friday while playing in the annual ice hockey game against Cambridge University.

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
