2,986 Flights Made At Medford Airport

A total of 2,986 airplanes landed or took off from the Medford airport during January, an increase of 466 flights over December, 1959, and an increase of 386 flights over January a year ago, according to the monthly airport report.

Some 847 of the flights were air carrier, (Pacific, United or West Coast airlines) 17 were military flights and 2,122 were civilian flights (private planes).

Passenger traffic was 4,242 in January, slightly higher than December's traffic of 3,256, but below that of a year ago, when 5,512 passengers used the airlines.

Some 13,842 pounds of air freight, 2,534 pounds of express freight and 20,978 pounds of mail were handled at the airport last month.

Airport revenue during January totaled \$3,666.71, according to the report.

Problems of Aged When Out of Work

Few people realize what a tragedy it can be when thousands of middle-aged and elderly men are thrown out of work by the failure and extinction of the company for which they have worked all their lives. As we can see from the excellent article of Harold L. Sheppard, on what happened to 10,000 workers when the Packard company went out of business, a high percentage of these men soon discovered that most companies will not hire a man over 40 or 50.

I recently talked to a highly competent construction engineer who, at the age of 50, was left jobless when his old employer died and the company folded. As he said, "I have been to any number of men who could employ me, and who know that for years I have been in the front rank of engineers, but they all say, 'Sorry, Bill, you are too old; it isn't our policy to take on a man of 50.'"

Obviously, as Sheppard says, for several reasons it is most unwise to keep these men and families on relief. It is too costly. All right, then, why not do something re-

dial about it? I do not see how we can pass a law, as was proposed, banning discrimination against the aging employee. There are many old people who cannot fit well into a new group and a new job; and there are some whose ability to drive hard at a job for eight hours each day is gone.

Must Build Shops

What I think we need, and must soon develop and build are shops in every city--shops like the one of Henry Viscardi Jr. (Abilities, Inc., in Albertson, N.Y.) where the crippled, the blind, the deaf and the epileptic earn a good living. There must be shops also for the slightly psychotic, and for persons over 40 who lost his job and cannot find another. For the persons over 60, there may be shops in which a man can work four or six hours a day; and there should be shops for women, in which they can work for as many hours as they have strength for.

As many writers have been pointing out: in our race to hold our own in this world, we just cannot afford to deny so many of our people a chance to work. We greatly need their hands, and what their hands can make and build.
