Conduct School

Formula for
Public Highway
Monies Outlined

Washington - UPI - The nation's governors told senators Wednesday how they could pump \$900 million into the interstate highway program. The initial reaction to the proposal was friendly.

Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff of Connecticut outlined a new formula at an informal joint meeting of the Senator's Public Works and Finance committees. Sen. Pat McNamara (D-Mich.), chairman of the public roads subcommittee, presided at the closed session.

Ribicoff later withheld a public explanation of the governor's plan pending another meeting with the House Ways and Means Committee. However, Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) told newsmen there was "a meeting of the minds between senators and governors on what should be done on the interstate system."

The question, said Gore, is whether the administration can be persuaded to spend the necessary funds.

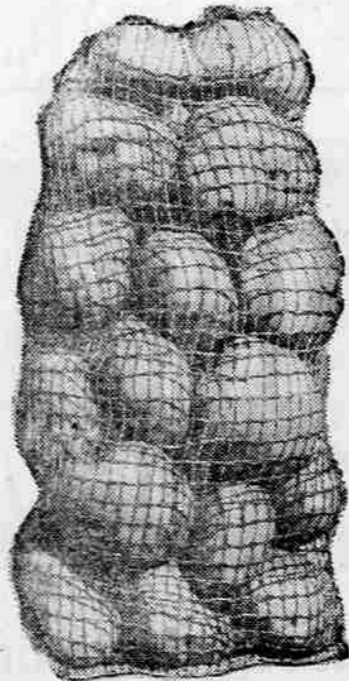
