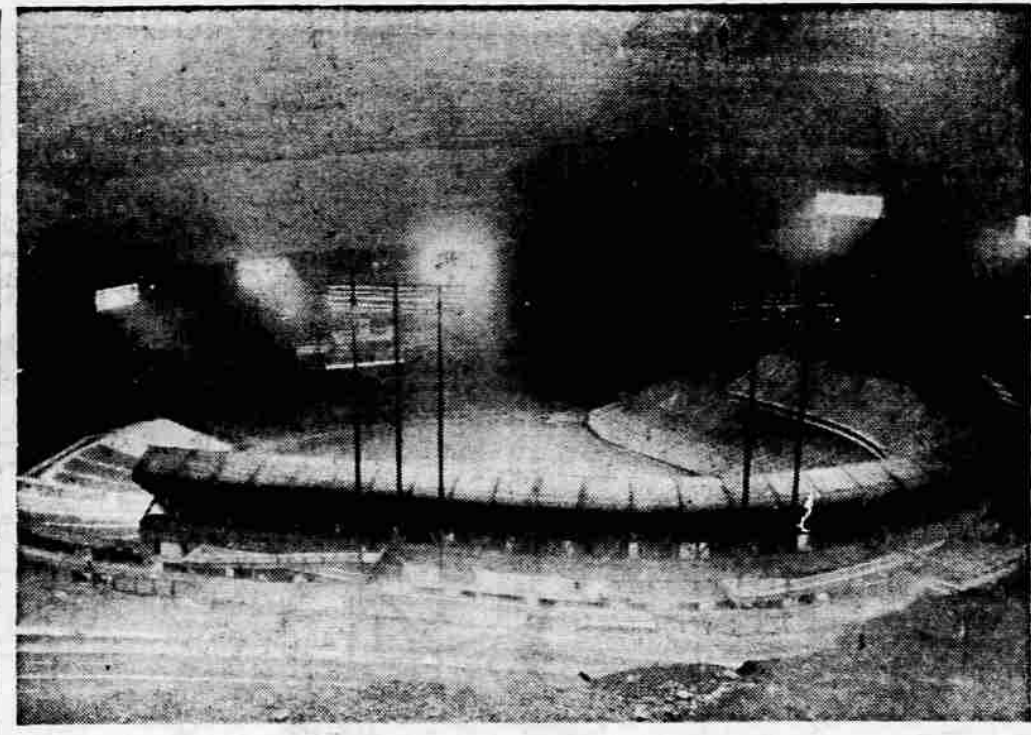

Among the 150 pros entered in this 72-hole tournament were Art Wall Jr., Pomona Manor, Pa., 1959 leading money-winner, Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif., reigning national PGA king, Billy Castor, Apple Valley, Calif., 1959 National Open winner, and Gene Littler, the quiet big money-winner from Singing Hills, Calif.

Asian Flu Said Causing Increased Number of Deaths

Washington (UPI)—The Asian flu epidemic, now striking victims in almost half the states, is causing an increasing number of deaths from influenza and pneumonia. During the first five weeks of this year, 4,033 persons were reported to have died of flu and pneumonia in 108 larger cities, an increase of 44 per cent over the same period last year. The 1960 death total was 20 per cent higher than in the first five weeks of 1958 when the original Asian flu epidemic still was in progress. Surgeon General Leroy Burney said the figures, released by the Public Health Service, "seems to bear out clinical impressions of some physicians that they are encountering a more than normal amount of pneumonia this year. He said that in contrast to the 1957-58 Asian flu outbreak, respiratory infections this year are attacking adults more than children. Some reports indicate most pneumonia and flu fatalities are over 65 years old.

Davidson Seeks Josephine Post

Grants Pass — Bruce E. Davidson, Democrat incumbent Josephine county commissioner, Tuesday filed to seek the party's nomination for the post. He was first elected in 1956. Fred Reid, Grants Pass city councilman, earlier filed for the Republican nomination for county commissioner. After moving to Oregon from California, he worked for the state highway department for a time, and was an engineering aide for the Army at Camp White.

Former 'Y' Man Dies

Newburyport, Mass. — Charles A. Caburn, 88, former New Jersey state secretary of the YMCA and former associate state secretary of the YMCA in Massachusetts and Rhode Island, died Wednesday.
