### Radiators May Stage Comeback In New Homes

Urbana, Ill.—(Science Service)—Radiators may make a comeback in houses if builders heed the word of a University of Illinois mechanical engineering professor here.

Radiators using hot water to supply steady heat in houses can be made competitive with other heating systems if small copper tubes are used for plumbing and water is pumped through the system.

"Large pipe sizes required in the old gravity hot water systems are not necessary in a forced-circulation hot water system," Prof. Warren G. Harris told a group of contractors and architects here.

"The high cost of installing this kind of system is one reason hot water heating has been limited in the past to the more expensive houses," he said.

Tests on a "hydronic research house" on the University's campus showed that forced hot water systems worked well when three-fourth-inch copper tube was used for the trunk main, one-half-inch tubes for the branch mains, and three-eighths and one-fourth inch tubes for radiator circuits. Most conventional designs now call for minimum pipe sizes of three-fourth-inch for the main and one-half-inch for radiator branches.

The smaller, flexible pipe is easier to connect, and installation cost for a new six-room two-story house is about \$150 less than for more conventional piping systems, estimates showed.

### Jackson Named For Eastern Tour

Glenn L. Jackson, Medford, vice president of the California Oregon Power company and state highway commission member, has been selected as one of the 19 business and industrial leaders to accompany Gov. Mark O. Hatfield on an Oregon industrial development tour of the east and midwest next month.

During the week of March 20 the group will tell "the Oregon story" to top executives of large national industrial firms at luncheon meetings in New York City and Chicago.

Invitations have been sent to presidents and board chairmen of some 300 of the nation's top corporations. The guest list was compiled by an advance team of six Oregon businessmen who spent two weeks in the cities to be visited.

Following the tour an intensive "sell Oregon" campaign will be undertaken. Each guest at the luncheon meetings will be sent a specially-prepared brochure on Oregon. A "sales team," working with the department of planning and development, will then make personal calls on many of the "prospects."

Purpose of the tour and follow-up program, it was stressed, is to sell the entire state and not any selected area or community.

### Motherwell Trial Gets Under Way

Downieville, Calif.—(UPI)—The prosecution began its case Wednesday in the murder trial of Larry Lord Motherwell, who is charged with the slaying of a 72-year-old Washington, D.C., widow.

The opening statement was presented to a jury of nine women and three men which was chosen Tuesday, despite defense objections that it was overloaded with women.

The jury was seated so quickly that even the prosecution was taken by surprise. The attorneys told Superior Judge Warren Steel they planned for arrival of witnesses from the East next week end.

Motherwell, 43, is charged with slaying Mrs. Pearl Putney after touring the country with the widow in 1958. Bones identified as hers were found on a mountain road near here.

## Institute for Math Students Planned At Oregon State

Corvallis — A unique seven-week institute for 50 mathematically-gifted high school students will be held at Oregon State college this summer under sponsorship of the National Science Foundation.

Fifty boys and girls will be picked from Oregon and adjoining regions to take the special program that will include a "taste of everything" in advanced modern mathematics. High school juniors will mostly be selected but some sophomores and even a few freshmen may be named.

The June 27 to Aug. 12 institute is designed to give the especially-able math students an insight into the tremendous new fields of mathematics and its application in science, engineering and industry. It is one of the first such programs offered in the country.

Dr. Robert E. Gaskell, professor of mathematics, will be institute director.

Students will be picked on the basis of their high school scholastic records and recommendations from teachers and principals. Application blanks are available from Dr. Gaskell.

The National Science Foundation has given OSC a grant of \$18,500 to conduct the experimental program. Students selected will receive study grants covering a part of their expenses.

Oregon State college will offer four other NSF-supported summer institutes this year for 200 high school and college teachers of science. Grants totaling \$241,900 were received last month for these programs.

Since the National Science Foundation program was started five years ago, OSC has been one of the leading centers for training. Up to now, however, the institutes have been for teachers. This is one of the first special programs for high school students.

**Weekly Schedule**  
A typical weekly schedule at the institute will include 16 hours of math lectures and class discussion, 10 hours of laboratory work, and special study periods to allow students to do daily assignments.

Washington — (UPI)—Highlights of President Eisenhower's news conference in Washington Wednesday:

Other highlights of Eisenhower's news conference:

—He said Russia appears to be offering greater hope for agreement on an H-bomb test ban by moving away from its previously rigid position on inspection and control. He deplored Russia's action in rejecting his plan to ban all nuclear weapons tests except smaller underground blasts which defy detection under current long-range methods.

—He said an Air Force reserve training manual, which referred to churchmen following the Communist party line, had been recalled and repudiated by the Air Force.

**Choice of Vice President**  
—He believes that a presidential nominee must have a party's vice presidential nominee if there are to be the same close relations between a president and vice president that he has had with Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

—He deplored the fact that a spirit of nationalism and craving for prestige impelled countries such as France to want to explode their own A-bombs. But he acknowledged that this was a perfectly understandable desire under current circumstances.

### Local Resident Completes Course

Corvallis-Raymond S. Fish of Medford completed a special three-day training program for sewage works operators Feb. 17 at Oregon State college.

The college offers the short course each year as a service to cities, sanitary districts, and private utility companies. Purposes are to promote efficient and economical operation of sewage works systems and to reduce hazards to public health in the disposal of sewage and industrial wastes.

Sponsors of the course with OSC are the Oregon state board of health, Oregon state sanitary authority, and the League of Oregon Cities. Instruction covers basic fundamentals of sewage treatment, laboratory tests necessary to control the sewage-treatment processes, and plant operation and maintenance.
