## Council Takes No Action on Billboard South of Medford

The Medford city council took no action last night on a recommendation from the planning commission that a request to erect a billboard at the south end of the city be denied.

This means that the commission's recommendation will stand and the sign will not be erected.

Several Medford High school students who will be some of those taking part in Student Government Day next week were at the council meeting to see how the regular city government performs.

Those attending the meeting and what their city offices will be next week are John Lacy, councilman Ward I; Jim Lacy, chief of police; Patty Barnes, planning consultant; Judy Bash, councilwoman Ward IV; Dave Ryn, councilman Ward III; Lee Cook, councilman Ward III; and Gary Milne, police captain.

One of those attending last night's meeting said that more of the students, including Student Mayor Pat McLoughlin, were not able to attend because of last night's senior class party at the high school.

Regarding last night's meeting which lasted just a little over a half hour, John Lacy said it was pretty short and seemed to go off rather smoothly. When asked if he thought the student's council meeting next week would be as short, he said he didn't think so.

The council postponed action on a request from Southern Pacific railroad to build two spur tracks on McAndrews rd., and will consider the request at the next regular meeting.

In response to a query from the audience regarding the park and recreation commission's "reluctant" recommended abandonment of the proposed diving pool at the Jackson pool project, Mayor John Snider said the council feels strongly about the pool and wishes it could do something, but every possible way of raising the \$17,000 has been explored and "it just can't be done."

The council accepted a low bid of \$17,017.25 from the Signal Oil company to pro-

vide gasoline, diesel oil and kerosene to the city for the coming year, and also accepted a low bid of \$764.65 from the Tidewater Oil company to provide the city with motor oil, gear and chassis lubrication.

The council approved a United Air Lines request to lease a small building at the municipal airport for the storage of oil and also approved the purchase of several properties which are necessary for the city's plans to extend 10th st. from Portland ave. to Riverside ave. including a new bridge.

New York—(UPI)—Sales of cat food will top \$60 million and cats will eat up another \$45 million worth of dog food in 1960, according to the Puss 'n' Boots division of the Quaker Oats Co. The cat food manufacturer said that the current U.S. cat population totals 28 million, compared with 26 million dogs. It also estimated that 24 per cent of American families—about 12 million—own one or more cats.

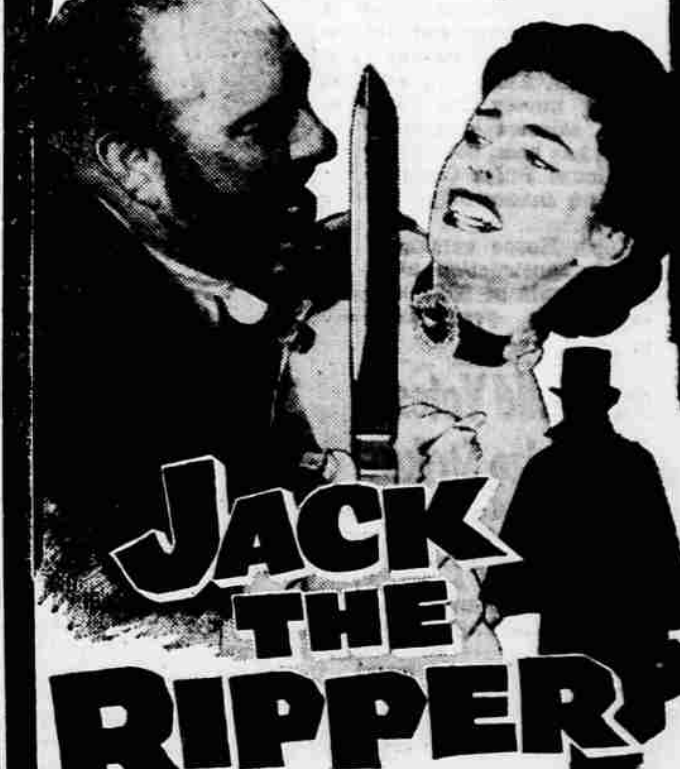
