## The Medical Roundup

### A Dual Personality

Women write asking what can be done for their husband who is two different people. At his office, he is quite a man, perhaps running a big business, making quick decisions about; ordering a lot of people about; standing up firmly against heavy competition, and making a lot of money. But when he gets home, he acts more like a frightened child; full of fears about his health; constantly begging for sympathy and reassurance; and constantly taking an assortment of half a dozen pills. The poor wife finds it hard to keep her respect and any love for a man who is constantly acting like a baby. She says he has had quite a bit of psychoanalysis, but so far it hasn't changed him much. She says if he does not

grow up, she is afraid she will have to leave him. I do not know what can be done. Many a time I have said to such a man, "Can't you see that you have been changing a lovely wife into nothing more than a psychiatric nurse? Is that really what you want to do? I should think you would be making a tremendous effort to conquer your childish fears and feelings in insecurity." **Fatty Tumors Can Be Hereditary**

In a recent article, F. E. Stephens and Arnold Isaacson, of the University of Utah, described a case of a family in which, in three generations, there were 17 persons who had many round lumps under their skin. These lumps consist of fat, and hence are called lipomas. Many people have only one or two, while some people have two or three dozen scattered all over their body. Only rarely will one grow large enough so that it is a nuisance and has to be removed. Many of these little fatty tumors are about as big as a good-sized after-dinner mint, while some are as large as half a hen's egg. One good thing about these little lumps is that they do not turn into anything and, hence, a person doesn't have to worry about cancer growing in them.

**Will Diabetes Cause Neuritis?** Several people have written to complain of a number of discomforts, such as pains and burnings which their physician suspects are due to diabetic neuritis. He is probably right. I am told that diabetics are particularly likely

to get into trouble with neuritis if they do not behave themselves, if they sometimes go off their diet or fail to take their medicine regularly and wisely. Severe diabetes is a disease that the patient cannot afford to neglect. If he is to live out his three score and ten, and have good health along the way, he must behave himself; he cannot, every so often, go on an eating binge, and hope to avoid paying for his misdeeds.

Dates for local U.S. Army reserve units annual active duty summer training have been announced by headquarters, Medford subsector command, X.

Brig. Gen. William H. Prentice, assistant commander, 104th division, will be at Ft. Ord, Calif., Aug. 14-27.

The second battalion, 414th regiment (Bct), commanded by Lt. Col. Robert A. Elliott, and receiving company, 104th division (Tng), commanded by Capt. Robert D. Stephensen, will train at Ft. Ord Aug. 14-27.

The 382nd quartermaster battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. Donald B. Whalin, will train at Ft. Lewis July 31-Aug. 13.

## Information on Social Security Available at Local District Office

Residents can easily find out what social security means to them, Edward Jacobson, district manager of the Medford social security administration office, has reminded citizens. Persons can call or visit the local office and representatives will give information about the program's effect, and answer questions.

Most people have definite plans when they buy insurance, either in the line of retirement income or to provide for their survivors, Jacobson noted. The same thought should apply to social security benefits. Attention should be given particularly to the benefits payable under the Social Security Act, as practically all wage earners and self-employed individuals have at least partial protection, he said.

No one will say that social security by itself will provide completely for retirement or care for the family in the event of death or disability. It is, and was meant to be, a base on which to build for those events, Jacobson said.
