

Student Officials For Government Day Listed for Event

Student Government Day, which starts Wednesday in the Medford Elks jurisdictional area, will mark the 12th consecutive year for the event in which area high school students are elected and appointed to work with their respective counterparts in city and county government.

Purpose of the program is to give students in senior classes of the participating schools an opportunity to see local government in action at the time they are studying the subject in classes.

In addition to the experience the program provides, it also points up the contrast in philosophy between a democracy and a communist run state, according to Dr. Leonard B. Mayfield, superintendent of Medford schools.

Dr. Mayfield, who spent 30 days touring Russian and European educational and other institutions last fall, said he found no evidence of such a program in Russia.

Some Evidence Noted
He said there was some evidence of activities that provide opportunities for student leadership in Russia's Pioneer program, but the leadership was limited to carrying out the program of the Communist party, and did not permit an opportunity for the students to initiate new ideas through regular democratic procedures.

Dr. Mayfield noted that a student in Russia may acquire some experience in governmental procedures, but the opportunity appeared to be limited to only a select few designated as "Konsomols," or students who have been selected for special indoctrination that will lead to membership in the Communist party.

"The emphasis in their educational system," he said, "is just the opposite of ours—they provide opportunities which discipline the student to follow rather than to lead."
