Hairy Moles on the Face

Many women ask me if they should get rid of hairy moles on their face, and if so, how should they be removed and by whom. Yes; if I were a woman with a hairy mole on my face, I certainly would not leave it there a day.

DR. ALVAREZ Why be constantly unhappy and ashamed when, in a few seconds, it could be safely removed? Skin specialists commonly take them off with the help of very hot electric sparks or an electric soldering-iron, or with a curette or tiny spoon with sharp edges. First, a drop of procaine solution is injected under the mole so that its removal will not hurt.

If a mole is so big that it had better be cut out and the wound sewed up with an invisible scar, a good man for the job is a plastic surgeon.

Undulant Fever

As I have said before in this column, undulant fever, or brucellosis, is usually a long-lasting fever which occurs almost always in men who handle cattle or pigs—either alive or dead. Hence it is found usually in farmers and ranchers, and workers in meat-packing establishments. It is common among veterinarians who have to treat sick animals, and it should be common among milkers because it is the udder of a sick cow that it often much involved in the disease. Curiously, the farmer's wife rarely gets the fever, even when her husband and the hired man have had it.

About the only way in

which a city-dweller can get it is by drinking raw, unpasteurized milk. Hence it is that usually, when I find a woman who has never been near a cow or a pig; who has always drunk pasteurized milk, whose symptoms have been present for years—and are really those of nervousness—I haven't much faith in her doctor's diagnosis of brucellosis. During 25 years at the Mayo Clinic, I must have seen scores or hundreds of women who came with the diagnosis of undulant fever, but admitted
