

Russians Have Seven Gold Medals in Winter Games

athletes already had compiled 63 1/2 points in the "battle" for the unofficial title. And they have won seven of the 24 medals already awarded — four more than any other nation.

What's more they were favored to pick up at least one more gold medal today, perhaps two. There was no prospect for a first place for the U.S. in today's three championship events.

Sweden Closest To Russia

Sweden was closest to Russia with 29 points, followed by Germany with 28 and then the U.S. with 16. In the medal department it was three for the U.S. but none of them gold — only one silver and two bronze. But there is a gold one coming up Tuesday unless that skater, Carol Heiss, the "old lady" in the field at the tender age of 20, falls flat on the ice in today's final compulsory figure or Tuesday's free skating events.

And the U.S. hockey team made the championship round when it slaughtered Australia Sunday night, 12-1, to join Russia — yes, again — Canada, Czechoslovakia, Germany and Sweden in the title round. There wasn't much hope they would beat out the Russians or the Canadians, but at least they were still alive.

As for the skier: Tommy Corcoran — who was fourth in the giant slalom Sunday — was born in Japan, became a U.S. citizen, went to Dartmouth and Harvard and now lives in Beaconsfield, Canada.

Largest Winter Crowd

There were more cheers for him Sunday than anyone else from the crowd of 47,000 — the largest ever to view a winter sports event in the United States — when he flashed down mountain KT-22, to honorably combat the favored European competitors.

His time of one minute and 49.7 seconds wasn't good enough to beat "em, but it came close. He was only six-tenths of a second out of third place — the bronze medal — one fleeting second out of second — the silver — and a mere one and four-tenths seconds away from the gold medal.

For Tommy, it was a farewell to skiing — on the day of his greatest glory.

"I'm having my last fling," he grinned. "It's time to go to work."

In the women's figure skating, the winsome Carol has amassed 625.8 points in the four compulsory figures which have been performed thus far, compared to 580.5 to Holland's shapely miss, Sjoukje Dijkstra. It would take a

miracle to keep her from winning the gold medal.

Another U.S. lass, 18-year-old Barbara Ann Roles of Temple City, Calif., was in third place and another teenager, Laurence Lorrie Owen, only 15 and from Winchester, Mass., was in fifth place.

Double Winner Possible Today

Squaw Valley —UPI— The first double gold medal winner of the winter Olympics was in prospect today with the running of the 1000-meter women's speed skating.

Included in the entry list for the event were two gold medal winners — Helga Haase of Germany, who captured the 500 meter race, and Lidija Skoblikova, winner of the 1,500 meter race Sunday in world record time.

In Sunday's 1500 meter race, Miss Skoblikova was pushed to victory by Helena Pilejczyk of Poland who finished third in the standings on a time basis. The Polish lassie's teammate, Elwira Seroczynska, was only five-tenths of a second off the Russian girl's world record-breaking time.

Switzerland's Roger Staub rated as downhill favorite off his win in Sunday's giant slalom race. The Nordic battle shaped up between the Russians, Norwegians and Finns.

Staub prefers the downhill to the slalom in which he finally broke the jinx of being an "eternal second." He started eighth in a field of 66 skiers from 23 countries.

His major competition includes first off Egon Zimmermann, the Austrian boy friend of U.S. Alpine princess Penny Pitou; Willy Bogner of Germany; Austria's Josef Stiegler, who finished second in the giant slalom, and Adrien Duvallard of France, an advocate of the metal ski.
