

Medford Still No. 2 In UPI Poll

Marshfield and Medford, which already have clinched berths in the upcoming state A-1 high school basketball tournament, again rank one-two this week in the United Press International coaches' poll.

Marshfield, with an impressive 18-1 record, got seven first place votes again this week for 79 points while Medford picked off one first place ballot and was named second by the remaining coaches for 73 points.

Cleveland of Portland edged Hermiston, another journey team, for third place by two points. Hermiston got 53 points and fourth place.

Klamath Falls, four-time loser to Medford, again holds down fifth with 45. La Grande, another tournament club, is sixth this week.

South Salem and David Douglas both moved up the ladder in the poll and share the seventh position.

Roseburg slipped to ninth this week after dropping a one-point decision to North Bend over the week end.

Jefferson made its way into the select after being missing for a week. The Democrats from Portland got 13 votes for the 10th spot.

Boys and girls under the age of 16 years can become members of the Junior Bass club and receive a shoulder patch and membership card for a dollar.

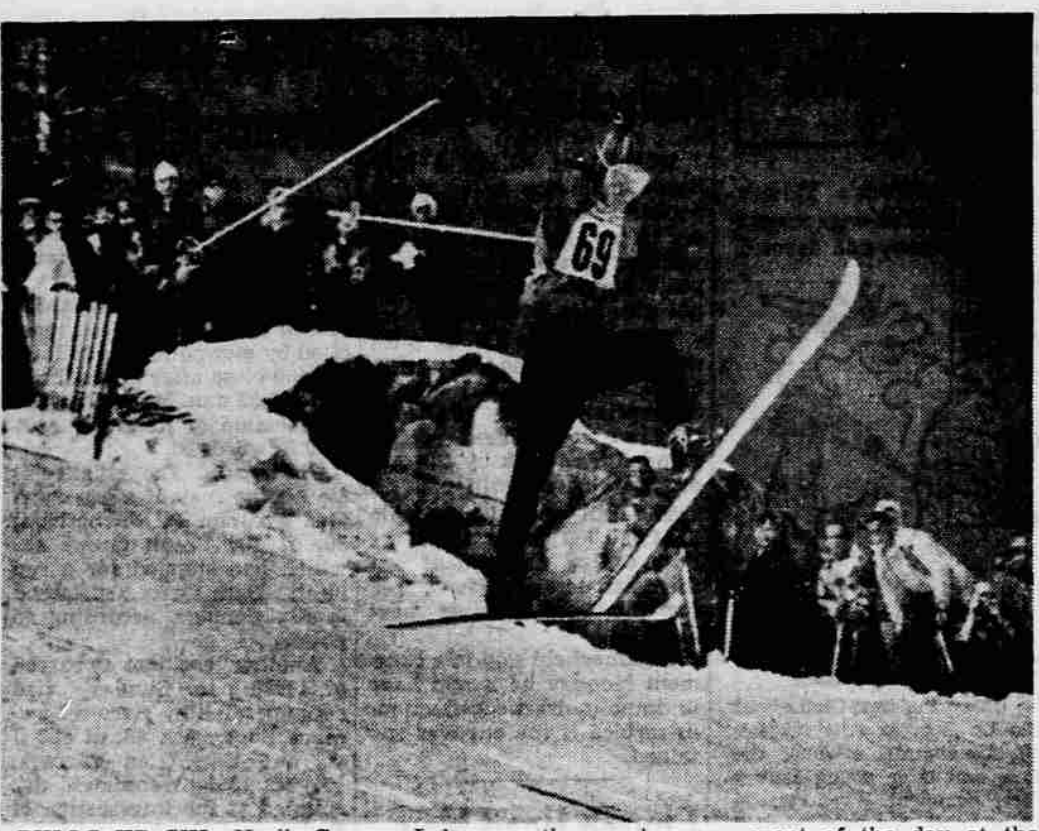

U.S. Sure To Forge Ahead On Blades of Carol Heiss

Squaw Valley—UPI—The United States, in the midst of another speed skating controversy, seemed sure to get out of the Olympic also-ran category today on the shining silver blades of Carol Heiss.

Queen Carol, three-times world champion and already leading her 25 competitors by a wide margin, should pick up the gold medal in ladies' figure skating. And that would put a Yank on the top pedestal of the victory stand for the first time in the games.

The U.S. team, point-blank Monday in the unofficial scoring, also could pick up a bronze medal in this competition if Barbara Ann Roles of Temple City, Calif., can hold her third place standing after the compulsory figures were completed Monday.

And there is a chance that one of the beauty queens of the U.S. giant slalom ski team could win a medal. It might be pigtailed Penny Piteu of Laconia, N.H., All-American beauty Betsy Snite of Norwich, Vt., or Linda Meyer of Mammoth Lakes, Calif. All three have a strong chance.

Other Wins Unlikely
But there seems no chance for victory in the other two events—the men's 15-kilometer cross-country, and the ladies' 3000-meter speed skating.

The speed-skating members of the U.S. team are in rebellion—and it is doubtful that the Yankee skaters can be depended on to give much of a challenge to the crack athletes from Russia and the other European nations.

Several of the U.S. team members complained to Irving Jaffee, former U.S. Olympic Champion that they were getting no attention from their coach or manager.

Bingham is in the Olympic infirmary, recovering from a flu attack, and could not be reached for comment.

Meanwhile, the Russians pushed ahead in their rout of the unofficial team championship. They had chalked up 86½ points against a surprisingly strong German team that had 48. Sweden was next with 29—and the U.S., which

failed to get a single point Monday—was fourth with 16. But there were plenty of European heroes Monday.

Jean Vaurnet, a 27-year-old French hotel man, won the men's downhill on the icy slopes of Squaw Peak. Miss Guseva, a 22-year-old Russian school teacher, won the 1000-meter (about 3/4 mile) speed skating; and Georg Thoma, a decided underdog, won the Nordic combined.

Now, OTI holds the lead in the OCC by one-half game over the Raiders with an 8-5 record to SOC's 9-6.

No matter what happens tonight between the two clubs, the Raiders still have possession of one tournament berth in the District II NAIA playoffs at South Salem high school March 1 and 2.

Bill Bowerman In Spotlight as Distance Coach
Bill Bowerman, the ex-Medford high athlete and mentor who has risen into national limelight as track coach at University of Oregon, gets further attention, along with his athletes in a Feb. 22 Sports Illustrated article, "Masters of Endurance."

The article by Tex Maule compares Bowerman and Mihaly Iglol, tutor at Santa Clara Youth center, and tells of the competition of their distance runners. Bowerman is described as "a big, outgoing man with a somewhat violent sense of humor." Iglol and Bowerman are termed two of the finest distance coaches in the business.

The former Medfordite is credited with having developed more home-grown distance stars than any other American coach. Maule mentions Bowerman's deep regard for the psychological problems of his athletes and says his success with his distance men comes as much from this aspect as from his considerable technical gifts.

Georgia Tech, Irish Berthed For NCAA

Georgia Tech and Notre Dame are safely berthed today in the NCAA basketball tournament—and now Cincinnati may not be far behind.

Tech, a real surprise package with a 20-4 overall record, went on a 15-1 rampage in an overtime period at Gainesville, Fla., Monday to wrap up the Southeastern Conference's spot in the big post-season carnival by beating Florida, 69-55.

Notre Dame 15-7 accepted a "member at large" berth in the same tourney earlier in the day and may be Tech's first tourney rival, if first the Irish can beat Ohio University in a preliminary round game.

But the big surprise Monday night was Bradley's 63-58 loss to Houston in the Missouri Valley conference race—a defeat that gave Cincinnati a one-game lead in the title chase with just three games to go.

Spring Zone Defense
Houston sprang a zone defense on fourth-ranked Bradley and led the Braves all the way in their clash at Houston. The loss was only the second for Bradley in 23 games and snapped a 15-game winning streak. Houston, hitting a torrid 59 per cent of its shots, was led by Gary Phillips with 30 points.

Cincinnati, meanwhile, romped to an 85-54 victory over North Texas, State despite another low-scoring game by Oscar Robertson. The "Big O", who was held to 14 points by Houston Saturday night, scored only 16 in this one—but his baskets gave him 956 for his career to tie Elgin Baylor's all-time collegiate record.

Eddie Machen Fights Friday

Betting is at "even money" on the outcome of their 10-rounder. Machen is ranked fifth among contenders by both the Ring magazine and National Boxing association. Hunter is rated sixth by the Ring and seventh by NBA.

Their bout will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC.

Wednesday's TV (ABC) 10-rounder at Chicago Stadium brings together middleweight contenders Dick Tiger of Nigeria and Gene (Ace) Armstrong of Elizabeth, N.J. It's a return bout in which Tiger hopes to repeat his upset victory of last Sept. 2 at Camden, N.J. However, Armstrong is favored at 2-1.

Middleweight contender Spider Webb of Chicago meets Rory Cloughlin in a rematch at the San Francisco Cow Palace Friday night.
