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Value of U.S. Property Holdings \$49,200,000,000

Washington—(UPI)—Uncle Sam owns 771,000,000 acres of land, including more than half the area of five states.

The government's worldwide property holdings and the buildings on them are valued at \$49,200,000,000 in terms of the original cost. The valuation jumped about 7 per cent in the last fiscal year.

Inventory Report—The General Services Administration, housekeeper for the government, came up with these figures in the "inventory report on real property owned by the U.S. throughout the world as of June 30, 1959."

Three million acres, or four-tenths of 1 per cent of the total government owned land, is outside the United States. The value of U.S. holdings abroad was estimated at \$4,100,000,000.

Valuation Up—The valuation of the government's real property went up \$3,600,000,000 from June 30, 1958, to June 30, 1959. Half that amount went into the building and enlarging of Air Force facilities, largely in connection with the Strategic Air Command dispersal program.

The states where the government owns more than half the land are Utah, 69.1 per cent; Idaho, 64.2 per cent, and Oregon, 51.2 per cent.

Compensation Due Public Employees—Salem—(UPI)—As of next July 1, all public employees in Oregon other than federal will be entitled to provisions of the workmen's compensation law, the Oregon Industrial Accident Commission said today.

The 1959 Legislature amended the law to extend to public employees benefits provided in the statute for private employees.

Employers coming under the act will be all state departments, counties, incorporated cities or towns, school districts, irrigation districts, and any other political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state which engages as an employer in any occupation.

This means that these employers will make premium payments to the industrial accident fund on the gross earnings of all employees including elected and appointed officials.

Premiums paid into the fund, the Commission said, will be on the same basis as those in private employment.

Octopus Found In Portland Creek—Portland—(UPI)—An octopus was found in Johnson creek at the edge of Portland Tuesday and fish experts said it was a practical joke.

The octopus was discovered by Robert L. Lentz who said he saw it "walking" downstream near the Johnson creek bridge in the southeast part of the city.

Lentz and a friend, Bob Butcher, lifted the creature from the creek with a power winch and Lentz said he cut off its head with a chisel-like tool.

He said the octopus tried to fight back by fastening its tentacles on his arm.

W. M. Morton, ichthyologist for the Fish and Wildlife Service, confirmed it was a real octopus and said it might have come from Puget Sound.

He said an octopus could not live long in fresh water. Jergen Westheim, research director for the Oregon Fish Commission, said it undoubtedly was placed in the creek by someone as a practical joke.

Escapée Suspected In Portland Holdup—Portland—(UPI)—The Center Street grocery on southeast Milwaukie blvd. was held up late Tuesday by a man whose description police said fitted that of escapee Richard T. Lenahan, 33.

Lenahan escaped from the county jail after the court-house here Monday night by saving his way through bars.

An investigation was under way to learn how he obtained the hackshaw blades.

The holdup man got away with an undetermined amount of money about 8:45 p.m. John Chiarlo, proprietor, said "I think he had a gun."

Lenahan has been in jail here since Jan. 5, 1959, on transfer from the penitentiary for trail on habitual criminal charges. He escaped as authorities tried to work out a program which would have led to his legal release.

'Senior Sneak Day' Said Not Illegal—Salem—(UPI)—Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today that as far as the law is concerned, there is nothing illegal about "senior sneak day."

That is when graduating high school seniors in some areas of the state are allowed a day off from school and organize their own trips.

At the same time, Thornton said, the school district is not liable for what happens to the students on that day, or for any damage to property that they may cause.

The question was brought up by District Attorney Richard J. Courson of Umatilla county who said that last year some high school students did considerable damage to a resort during sneak day activities.

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Death Threatens Man Who Assisted Meningitis Victim

New York—(UPI)—If Patrolman Thomas F. Reilly Jr. gets a headache or a stiff neck today, he may never see his two children again.

Just a week ago, Reilly tried to save the life of a woman who seemed to be choking to death. He used mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration. The woman, Miss Concetta Loria, 38, was dead when the ambulance arrived.

Reilly went back to his radio patrol car. He learned later that the woman had died of highly infectious meningitis, a disease that attacks the brain and spinal cord.

Given Antibiotics—Police doctors gave the 33-year-old patrolman heavy doses of antibiotics and ordered him to stay home. They told him to stay away from his wife, Dolores, and his two children, Kathleen, 7 and Thomas, 4.

The children have been told Daddy can't see them because he has a cold.

"I've given that kind of first aid before," Reilly says, "and if necessary I'll do it again."

The symptoms of meningitis are a headache, fever, chills, stiff neck. They usually take four to eight days to appear. Reilly is waiting.
