Window Exhibit Planned By Valley Art Association

As a preview and promise of coming shows, the new Rogue Valley Art association announces a window exhibit of three pieces of artistic work opening today at Barker's store. This is the first such effort of the new association, formed a few months ago to promote artistic endeavor and appreciation in all phases.

The exhibit is made up of a sculpture by Jan Zach, Eugene, a watercolor by Willard Martin, Portland, and a casein painting by Charles Voorhies, also of Portland.

The Zach work, entitled "Leaves" is of iron and brass puddling. This sculptor's work is described as dramatic and expressive, but not beautiful in the conventional sense. Born in Czechoslovakia in 1914, Jan Zach was trained in Prague both as a sculptor and a painter. In 1939 he was commissioned to do sculptures, paintings and other work for the Czechoslovak pavilion at the New York World's Fair.

For the next 11 years he was in Brazil, where he won great distinction as a sculptor and where he often collaborated with Oscar Niemeyer on important commissions. From 1951 to 1958, when he joined the School of Architecture and Allied Art at the University of Oregon, he lived in Victoria, B.C. Mr. Zach is president of the Northwest Institute of Sculpture.

Willard Martin's "Frosty Morning" is loaned by the University of Oregon Museum of Art, for exhibit in Medford. Mr. Martin attended the University of Oregon, where he was awarded the Ion Lewis scholarship in architecture in 1955 for study at the Palais des Beaux Arts in Fontainebleau, France. He was awarded the Ina McClung scholarship in architecture for the year 1956-57, and was graduated in 1957. He was for a time with the architectural firm of Wilmsen and Endicott in Eugene and later went to Portland. "Frosty Morning" was a purchase award winner in the first annual Oregon Art Alliance Membership exhibit sponsored by the Friends of the Museum in Eugene.

Of the three artists whose works are shown, Mr. Voorhies is the best known in Medford since he lived here as a young man and is a
