Gene Orr Leaves For D. C. Meetings

Gene Orr, Medford, left for Washington, D.C., this week end to attend meetings this week of the National Rehabilitation commission of the American Legion.

The meetings will last a week, Orr, a member of the commission, said. While he is in Washington he plans to talk to Oregon Representative Charles O. Porter on the feasibility of having a bill presented in this session of Congress to finance the proposed Agate Dam.

Tuesday morning Orr plans to go before the Veterans Af-

fairs committee of the House of Representatives and give them an outline of the legion's ideas on the legislation that will come before Congress this session.

The balance of the week, he said, will be spent meeting with various department heads of the veterans affairs division of the veteran's administration.

The commission hopes to help straighten out the mechanics of a new pension law which will go into effect July 1, he pointed out.

Orr is the only person from

Oregon on the 15-member commission and, along with four other persons, he represents the 11 western states on the commission.

This is the eighth year in a row that Orr has gone to the capitol city to attend the meetings.
