

### Johnson Feeling South Backlash

Washington—UPI—As a prospective presidential candidate in the Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson is feeling a backlash from the South for his efforts to get Senate action on a civil rights bill.

Assessments by Southern Democratic senators reflect a belief that Johnson has damaged himself at least temporarily with his Southern base of political support. They are disinclined yet, however, to conclude that the damage is permanent or that Johnson already has forfeited substantial support from the South.

The consensus appears to be that it is still too early to tell how the long struggle over civil rights legislation will affect the Texan's political future.

However unhappy or angry they may be, some of the Southerners are saying privately that Johnson is still their choice for the Democratic nomination.

None of the Southern senators has made any personal attacks on Johnson so far, although there have been veiled complaints about "tyranny" on the part of the "leadership."

### Film Heads Oppose Double Payments

New York — (UPI) — Major motion picture company presidents reaffirmed Sunday their opposition to payments to actors and writers when post-1948 movies are sold to television.

So-called "residual payments" are a major strike issue in a strike threatened by the Actors Guild March 7. The film company presidents said after a series of week end meetings here that the actors and writers in effect want to be paid twice for the same job.

### They said however they were willing to negotiate for any agreement on other points, including pension and health welfare plans, in talks now in progress on the West Coast.

### Multnomah College Purchases Building

Portland — (UPI) — Multnomah college Saturday announced purchase of the building on Southwest 13th ave. here owned by Westinghouse Broadcasting company and occupied by radio station KEX.

### John Griffith, college president, said the building was acquired to accommodate the expanding electronics and automation division and the Multnomah Data Processing Center. It will be occupied about June 1.

### Westinghouse acquired the three-story building in 1947. H. L. Bachman, general manager of KEX, indicated the station would soon announce plans for a new location.

### Air Force Balloon Instruments Saved

Cheshire, Conn. — (UPI) — The Air Force announced today that a huge plastic balloon found in an orchard here was valued research equipment following a cross-country flight.

### Officials at Westover Air Force base in Chicago, Mass., said the 100-foot long white balloon was launched last Thursday at Vernalis, Calif. It soared across the nation at altitudes ranging from 85,000 to 100,000 feet, broadcasting atmospheric conditions along the way, the Air Force said.

Finally on Saturday the balloon was deflated by radio and its payload automatically parachuted to earth.

### Landing Aid Improvements Suggested for Busier Airports

Washington — (UPI) — Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney (D-Okla.), has urged improvements in pilot landing aids at the nation's congested airports as a first step toward reducing the grim toll of air disasters.

Monroney, chairman of the senate aviation subcommittee, said 35 per cent of all civil air crashes in the last year occurred in "that critical last 60 seconds of flight."

He disclosed his subcommittee will concentrate its air safety recommendations in this area of split-second decisions — how best to help pilots get safely to the ground through high-density traffic.

### Death Toll Reaches 233

His comments came while two foreign crashes captured global attention. They raised the death toll of major 1960 air disasters to at least 233.

The collision of a big U.S. Navy plane and a Brazilian airliner Thursday at Rio de Janeiro killed 61. At least 27 were killed at last count the same day when an Italian air-

liner crashed and exploded after takeoff at Shannon, Ireland.

Monroney told United Press International his subcommittee will urge federal action for:

— Installation of high-intensity approach lighting, running 2,000 feet beyond runways, at more heavily-used airports. He said only four airports have this system on more than one runway — Idlewild, Newark, Los Angeles and O'Hara field in Chicago.

### More Radar Network

— More approach radar networks under the direction of federal aviation agency control tower personnel.

— Long-range weather bureau radar to facilitate improved forecasting of storms and onrushing weather disturbances that endanger airliners.

— Mandatory installation of flight recorders in all airliners. These tape recording devices, which automatically record up to 34 separate items

of vital flight data, are now required by the FAA only on commercial jets. They are valuable in accident investigations, or for use by maintenance men to later trace mechanical faults.

### Runway Visibility Range

— Place more emphasis on the new runway visibility range (RVR) system and encourage its installation at busy airports. RVR can tell a pilot at what point on his descent through soupy weather he will be able to see the runway. Present visibility information tells the pilot only at what altitude, immediately over the field, he can "break through" and see the runway.

Monroney said he will seek increased Congressional appropriations in all areas where additional funds will be needed to carry out his air safety recommendations.

A Senate committee recently restored \$100 million cut by the House from an appropriation bill providing long-range radar forecasting facilities by the weather bureau.

### Apalachin Meeting Claimed Warning to Narcotics Peddlers

New York — (UPI) — A federal narcotics official says that the major business of the Apalachin, N. Y., gangland meeting in November, 1957, was a warning to all members to get out of the narcotics racket.

Charles Siragusa, a field supervisor for the federal narcotics bureau, said the mobsters were warned that violation of the warning would mean execution. "This was subsequently manifested by the murders of a few top ranking gangsters who chose to violate the edict," Siragusa said.

### Blamed on Crackdown

Siragusa said federal undercover agents who had penetrated the underworld learned that because of a successful, stepped-up crackdown on the narcotics trade, "the crime syndicate elders had promulgated an edict for all members to cease and desist from trafficking in narcotics."

### But Siragusa said "younger elements ignored the edict" because of the fantastic profits from the racket. This defiance "received priority" at Apalachin and the ban was restated, as well as the warning that the reprisal for violators "would be by violence," Siragusa said.

Subsequently, Siragusa said, a number of top gangsters were murdered for ignoring the ban. He did not name them.

Other topics discussed at Apalachin, Siragusa said, included the taking over of gambling in Nevada; the Cuban gambling operation; and "a dispute for power" between rival factions.

Siragusa made the remarks at a Metropolitan law enforcement conference at Manhattan college.
