# Steel Companies Attempting to Hold Line on Price Increases

New York—UPI—Those Senators who watch and wait to pounce upon any inkling of price advances apparently are not going to have a chance on that score for another nine months.

Higher fringe benefits have raised steel costs but the steel companies are abating sorbing them right now. They are holding the line and hoping to continue to do so for a long time to come.

After Dec. 1 there'll be a pay raise for steel workers on top of the increased fringe benefits.

Then the steel companies will take a really hard look at steel prices.

According to Tom Campbell, editor-in-chief of the Iron Age, national metalworking weekly, the chances are 50-50 for a steel price raise after Dec. 1. They are equally 50-50 for no rise. So there you have it.

Meantime, the steel companies are spending at a rate of more than \$1.6 billion on plant rehabilitation. The total may go over that to a new high record, beating the \$1.7 billion spent in 1957.

Raw Materials Higher
This spending is seen as a desperate attempt to avoid raising steel prices. But there are problems. Not only will labor costs rise but there already have been and will be more rises in prices of raw materials.
