Princess' Fiance Has Public Debut

London—(UPI)—Antony Armstrong-Jones went back to "finishing school" in Buckingham Palace today, passing with high marks his first test as a member-elect of the royal family.

The 29-year-old former photographer took his fiancée, Princess Margaret to a performance of the Royal Ballet Tuesday night and got a frantically enthusiastic reception from 2,000 persons.

The nation also watched Tony's public debut with Margaret over television. It took place at the Royal Opera house.

The slight, handsome young man was surrounded by screaming women who surged at the police lines. "He's darling," some of them yelled. Tony looked alarmed at first. But he recovered quickly and won proud smiles of approval from his lovely fiancée for the aplomb with which he carried off his public baptism of fire.

Princess Margaret is president of the royal ballet and last night's performance was to aid its benevolent fund.

The program, arranged long before the engagement was announced last Friday, only coincidentally included a folk dance called "Princess Margaret's Fancy" and a ballet called "La Fille Mal Gardée" the "badly-guarded girl."

The badly-guarded girl is the story of a girl who chooses to marry a poor boy rather than a rich one.

African Music On Program For Ashland Concert

Ashland—African music will be featured in a program by the Ambassadors quartet at the Ashland Methodist church, Laurel and Main streets at eight o'clock tonight. This is the first Methodist musical group from Africa to have visited the United States, the church states.

Emphasis will be on African folk music, especially the songs of the Mashona tribespeople of Southern Rhodesia, home of the quartet members. The African people do much of their daily work to song, and these everyday work-songs will be a part of the program.

The quartet also will sing African lullabies, wedding and festival songs, hymns and chants. Western hymns and songs are in the repertoire. They will demonstrate various African musical instruments. The foursome will sing and drum in the garb of witchdoctors and in the animal skin garments that African villagers like to wear on festive occasions.

In addition to the musical program, the quartet will present a brief life sketch of one of its members, using color slides. The purpose is to give American Christians a picture of the life and development of an African Christian.

London—(UPI)—As a child Princess Margaret dubbed herself a holy terror but from the moment she wore her first tiny crown—at age six—she was the world's "princess charming."

Through photographs and anecdotes she seemed to emerge—even when she was a little girl, as everything romantic minds would like a princess to be.

Her older sister, Elizabeth, destined to be queen, was considered the serious one. But Margaret was gay and precocious, full of life and mischief.

Once she put tiptoe into her older sister's bath salts. Another time she was dressed as an angel for a costume party and her mother, the queen said "Well, darling, you will have to be very good now that you are dressed as a holy angel."

"Oh no," said Margaret. "You see, I'm a holy terror." She was a quicksilver child. Her comments were often sophisticated and witty beyond her years. She had an irrepressible sense of humor. Talent For Music

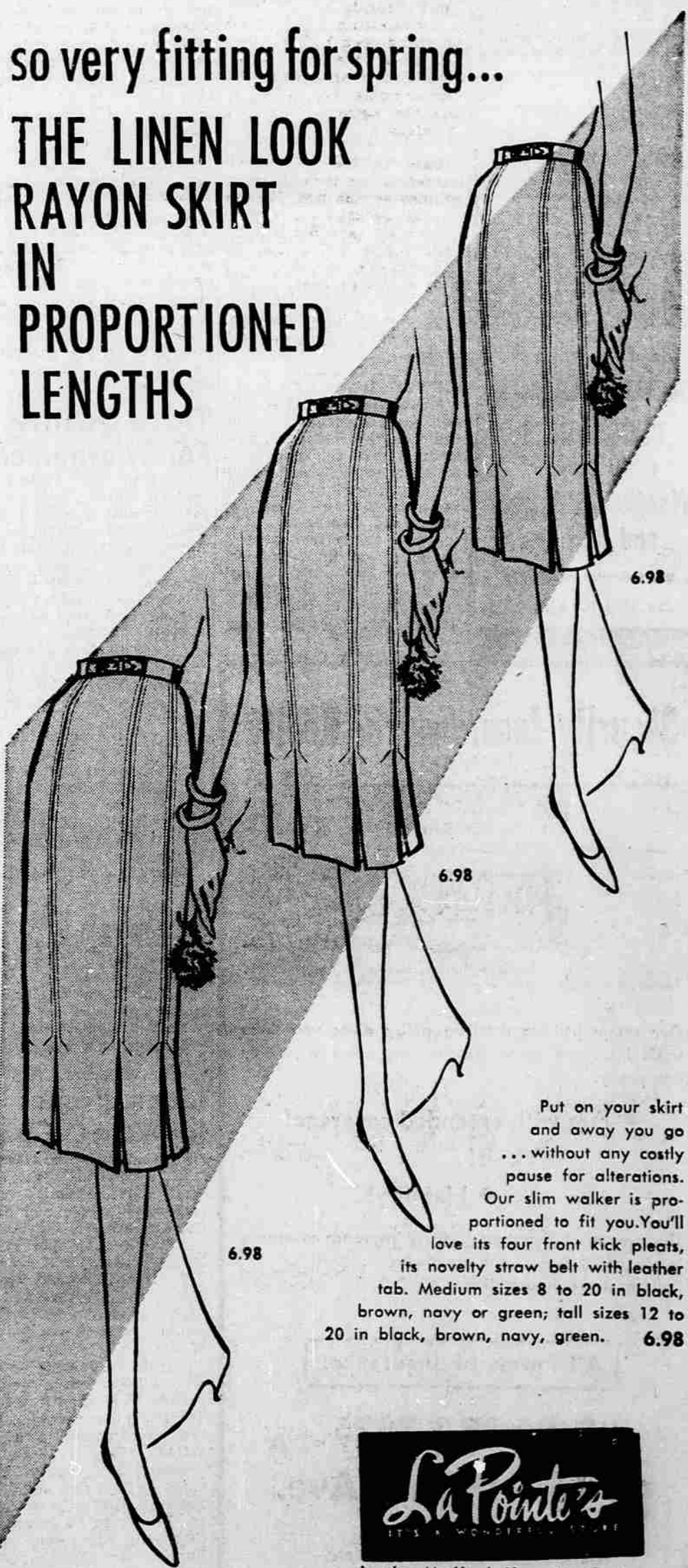
