Trucks Damaged In Two Accidents

A log truck and a freight truck and trailer were extensively damaged in separate accidents investigated by state police Tuesday.

West Must Present Ideas in Dealings With Middle East

"Ideas are the first line of defense," Lt. Gen. Sir John Bagot Glubb told members of the Rogue River Valley Knife and Fork club Tuesday evening in commenting on the "Middle East - Storm Center of the World."

General Glubb, for 15 years head of the Arab Legion, explained what he thought the Western powers had done wrong in the Middle East countries and what he thought must be done to improve relations.

Commenting on the Middle East, the speaker said that Western countries need to be on good relations with Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Syria and near-by countries for a trade passage and their large reserves of oil. Russia has nothing to lose there as they do not need the oil or the trade passage.

Therefore, General Glubb explained, the Communist countries are using the area as a stepping-stone to dominant Arabia.

Interest in Arabs Sir Glubb stated that prior to World II only the western powers were interested in the Middle East. After the war the efforts of the United States and Britain to have the Middle East countries resist Communist infiltration was interpreted by them that they were being used so the Western governments would get what they wanted.

The speaker said that the Arabs wanted to remain neutral, free of foreign influence but they wanted to modernize. Since they could not accomplish this without money they planned to borrow, he said, half from the Western countries and half from Russia.

General Glubb said that

about four years ago the Western powers cut off aid to any country accepting aid from Russia. This, therefore, forced the Middle East countries to borrow completely from the Communists.

This caused unrest in the countries, the speaker added, as the Arab Nationalists did not want to be dominated by the Communists. The struggle still exists today, he said.

Sir Glubb cited the different methods used by the West and Russia in international relations. Western powers usually speak directly with the governmental representatives in office. The Russians take no notice of those in office, but go directly to the school children and teachers. They, he explained, are not striving for immediate results, but for results 25 years from now.

During the past five years millions of Arabs have been taught to read and write. The Arabs, described as being extremely intelligent people, have no background knowledge and no experience of public affairs. They do not know how other countries live, he said, and are very quick to accept anything, but they do not judge truth. This, he added, is a propaganda paradise.

The Arabs respond in terms of emotions, not reason, which result in revolutions, he said.

Once the people have learned to read and write they want to know what is going on in the world. The Communist countries have made literature available to them in Arabic at an extremely low price.

Ideas are becoming more and more important to the human race, he said. Ideas sway the masses. To spread what the Western countries believe in can only be done by putting out information.

The Russians are constantly producing ideas, Sir Glubb said, while Britain and the United States only say "that isn't true" and do nothing constructive about it.

The Middle Eastern countries do not like to take charity and resent the Western countries paying for an entire project.

People can only be friends, if they are equal intellectually and socially, General Glubb stressed. Friends working for the same thing become partners working for a common cause. The Russians think in terms of 25 years from now, the Western countries think only of today.

Arabs believe that Britain and the United States go into their countries to make money or to beat the Russians.

"We should formulate what we want the world to be like in 1980," he said, "it should be spiritual, not material things."

Once the ideas have been presented to the Arabian governments, it should be explained that so these ideas may be accomplished their help is needed, the speaker continued. In this way the Western countries and the Middle East would work as partners.

"The Arab nations are just as anxious for a more secure and better world as the Western countries are."
