### Three-Nation Space Probes Scheduled

Washington, (Science Service) - The U.S. has tentative plans to buy British rockets to be filled with American instruments and launched by Australians at their Woomera range, an official of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said today.

Arnold W. Frutkin, director of NASA's office of international programs, told members of the Inter-American Defense Board here that NASA "hopes" to complete this unusual multi-lateral program for studying the upper atmosphere.

The rocket to be purchased is the Skylark, a solid propellant, unguided, and capable of carrying a payload of about 65 pounds.

Auction only moderately active, slaughter steers and heifers scarce; slaughter cows continued strong with last week's market, or strong to 50c higher than two weeks ago; slaughter bulls and calves scarce; stocker and feeder classes generally weak to 50c lower, with extremes of around \$1.00 off on calves. Bulk of supply of northern California origin.
