Building Permits Show Decline Here

For January, 1960, new residential construction totaled \$198,500 compared to \$215,000 for December, 1959, and \$207,000 for January, 1959. New non-residential construction for January, 1960, total \$11,400. Additions, alterations, and repairs totaled \$38,358 for January, 1960, it was reported.

Building permits are a report of plans rather than of construction actually being done. Interpretation of the information must allow for an elapse of time between issuing the permit and start of construction, a bureau spokesman explained.
