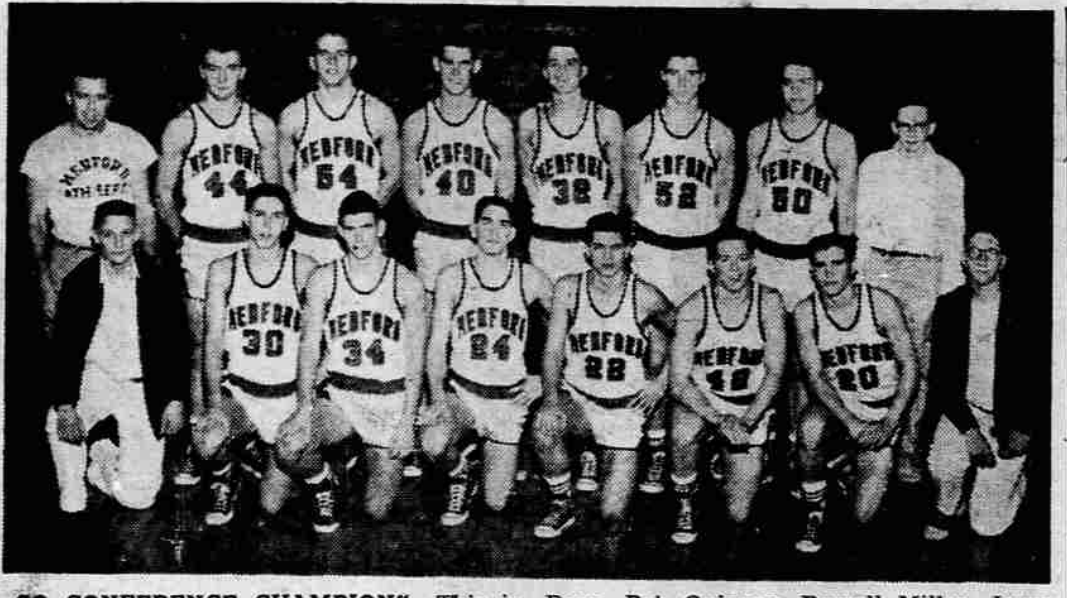

Grants Pass High school's basketball followers thunderously cheered at the shining possibility of stumping upset Friday night when saw their hopes quickly dashed by Oregon's No. 1 rated prep aggregation.

The Cavemen of the Climate city, contending on their home court, hemped three baskets in the first 1 1/2 minutes of action for 6 to 0 jump on the Medford Black Tornado. Then, the Big Wind of the Pear capital zipped into point-making gear and hurled in the next 12 markers to crush GP ambitions. Jerry Shults, Medford's early game stalwart, cashed in for nine of those tallies and got the Tornado on the way to a 74 to 43 victory.

This triumph gave Medford's hoopsters a brilliant undefeated record in their 16-game Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 campaign. Coach Frank Roelandt's league champions ended the regular season with their 17th straight win for a 19-3 record. The Tornado will go against Jesuit of Portland on Wednesday night, March 16, in its opening conflict in the state A-1 tournament at Eugene.

Medford was on top 15 to 9 at the quarter Friday night and had 31 to 15 and 53 to 23 margins at the other intermissions. Its biggest advantage was 33 points at 61 to 28.

Shults led all scoring with 19 counters and his teammate, Jerry Anderson had 16. Rex Benner paced the Cavemen with 10 retrieves and Anderson and Bob Quinney each nine as the Black Tornado dominated the rebounding 49 to 26.

The Tornadoes shot an unspectacular .263 for the field for the first half but hit .536 in the second half to make it 379 for the game. Grants Pass averaged .263 for the full route.

Benner sank a long pusher and a fine drive shot and Larry Janssen hit a jumper for the Cavemen's early gap. Anderson got Medford's first

Malin High school of Klamath county came from behind to edge St. Mary's of Medford 37 to 36 Friday night and won the right to represent District 5B in the state basketball tournament next week end at Baker.

The Mustangs earned the trip by downing the Crusaders for the second straight night in what was to have been a two-of-three playoffs. Action was in the Southern Oregon college gym at Ashland.

Malin headed 29 to 28 going into the last quarter. Larry Rick opened the final can for the Mustangs with a jumper but Roger Hout came

back for St. Mary's with a running shot from the side. Dick Evans jumped and Al Yates added a base line hook and the Crusaders were on top 34 to 31.

A Rick Iliian jump and a Larry Rick layin made it 35 to 34 for Malin. With just over a minute remaining Randy Miller put in two free shots for the Mustangs. After Hout's jump shot hacked the difference to 37 to 36, the Maliners held on to the ball until time ran out.

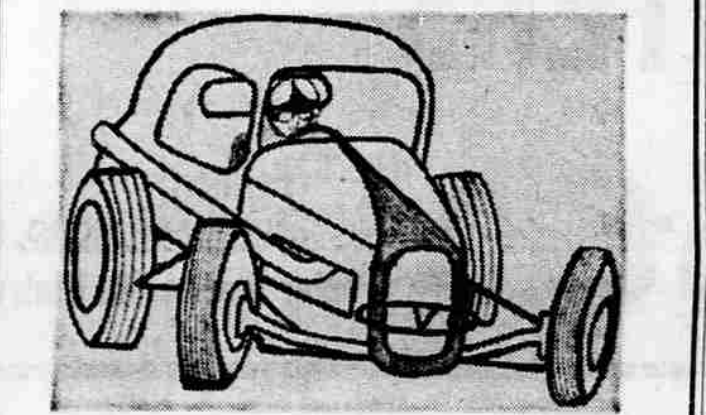
