Atlas Explosion Cause Studied

Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif. — An Air Force Board of inquiry today sought why an operational Atlas missile blew up on its launch-pad, retarding the ICBM nuclear retaliatory potential of the United States by one-third.

The military would not say if the Atlas was the nuclear armed and one long-range weapon believed always on around the clock alert at this base to fire in anger if necessary on 15 minutes notice.

The explosion — which did not occur during a launch countdown — was caused by a small fire on the launch pad during a routine fuel transfer training maneuver Saturday, the Air Force said.

The explosion partially destroyed one of three operational launch pads the U. S. has from which to fire the Atlas.

Snow accepts a belief, doubted by some, that the first written use of "Oregon" as a place name was by the famed Maj. Robert Rogers, leader of Rogers' Rangers and hero of Kenneth Roberts' historical novel "Northwest Passage."

He said Rogers wrote a letter in 1765 referring to "... the river called by the Indians Ouragon." This presumably was the Columbia river. Snow said the word was commonly used by Indians and the French in the 17th and 18th centuries to mean a dish or drinking vessel made out of birch bark.

Snow admitted he didn't know how Indians came to apply the name to the great river of the west. He speculated that "perhaps the birch-bark dish was a trading commodity between the natives of the Mississippi valley and those of the West."
