Salmon Patties

If you have a griddle on your range, you'll enjoy following this recipe for salmon patties: You will be able to fry the entire batch at once and they'll brown evenly with no danger of smoking or burning. Drain a 1-pound can of salmon and break it into small pieces, removing bones. Add 1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons finely chopped scallion, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon salt and a dash of pepper. Mix well and form into 8 patties. Brush one side of each patty with melted butter. Preheat the griddle to 350 degrees and turn buttered side of patty down on the griddle and cook for 5 minutes or until nicely browned. Brush top side with butter and turn and brown the second side. Serve with lemon and parsley.

Frozen Dinner Tip

If your family likes more seasoning on frozen prepared dinners you can partially remove the foil covering and sprinkle seasoning on the food before baking. Home service consultants of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers association recommend curry powder over creamed chicken, rosemary over meat loaf, thyme over beef and onion salt over Swiss steak to give these foods more excitement. Be sure to replace the cover and bake in a preheated gas oven. The best temperature to use is indicated on the directions of the package.

French toasted sandwiches topped with sauterne-flavored cheese or mushroom sauce make a hearty supper. Use your favorite Lenten filling and garnish the plate with a spiced crapple.

It is Girl Scout Week, and included on the program are Girl Scout Sunday, which was observed March 6, displays in various places of business, and a silver calendar tea Friday, March 11, at the Red Cross auditorium.

The public is invited to attend the tea between two and five o'clock in the afternoon.

Twelve women's organizations have been invited to participate in this event by displaying a table decorated in an appropriate theme for their assigned month of the year. The tables will be judged by a panel of three, and awards will be placed on the winning tables prior to the tea.

Participating will be Crater Lions' auxiliary, Medford Junior Service league, Medford Altrusa club, Contemporary Book club, Medford Jayettes, Medford Travel Study club, Kiwanian Dames, Medford Garden club, Central Point Garden club, Alpha Beta, Xi Mu and Beta Upsilon chapters of Beta Sigma Phi sorority.

Included were sessions on hosting, introductions, conversation topics, how to make friends, and other instructions which "give each girl a confidence and capability in adapting herself to social activities in the school and in the home."

Charm school has supplemented troop activities and has been held in four sessions, one each month for a period of three hours each with a few songs between topics for relaxation. Interested civic-minded individuals who specialize in a particular field have assisted the committee
