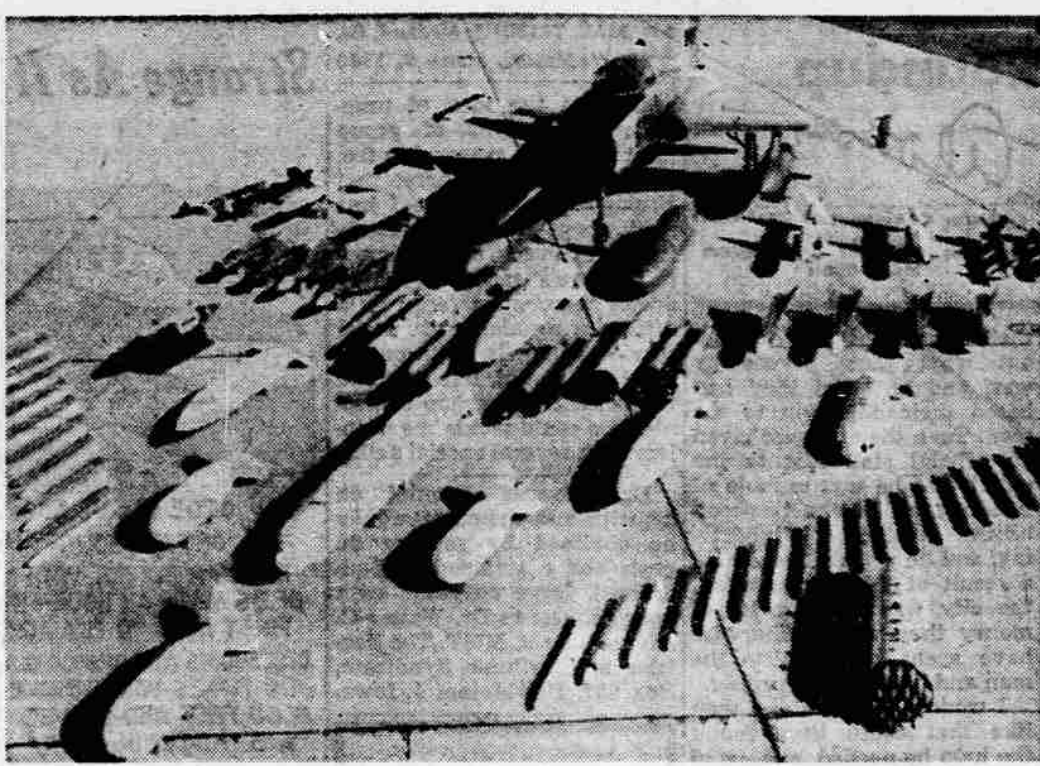

HYDROFOILS INTRODUCED—New standard size aluminum hydrofoils to fit outboard boats up to 2,000 pounds gross weight were introduced at the National Sports and Boat Show at San Francisco. The hydrofoils are shown being tested in San Francisco Bay. They lift the boat out of the water so that it strikes across the surface at three times normal speed, with only the foils and propeller submerged. Known as Up-Right Hydrofoils, the complete set consists of three foil assemblies; one for the stern and two for the bow. Installation is made with only 10 bolts.

New Strategies in War Against Cancer Told by Researchers

Philadelphia—(Science Service)—Two promising new strategies in the war against cancer were reported here. One is a technique for tailormaking drugs from nitrogen mustard, the crippling war gas used in World War I.

The other is a new screening technique for potential drugs. This technique has already been used to find two drugs that are now ready for clinical tests on human beings.

Attack Specific Kinds
Dr. William J. Steele, a research associate at the John Harrison Laboratory of Chemistry at the University of Pennsylvania, announced the tailormaking technique at the American Chemical Society's third Delaware Valley regional meeting. The chemist's research indicates the possibility that drugs of the nitrogen mustard type can be designed to attack specific kinds of cancer cells.

The war gas itself has long been used against certain cancers. But it was not thought that modifications of the molecular structure of the gas would radically change its action.

Dr. Steele found they did have different actions. He tested modified drugs on DNA, an acid in body cells that influences their growth.

Dr. Robert J. Rutman, senior research associate at the same lab as Dr. Steele, announced his new screening test. Instead of comparing animal tumors treated with a new drug against untreated tumors, he compares the tumor treated with the new drug against tumors treated by the standard drug now in use by doctors. This eliminates drugs that are helpful but not as good as present drugs.

Weather Bureau Lists Changes In Personnel Here

Harold Smith, who has been serving with the United States weather bureau at the Arctic ice floe station, has accepted a position with the weather station at the Medford airport.

Robert Church, meteorologist in charge, announced today that Smith has joined the staff as a meteorological technician. He will serve as a radiotheodolite operator and pilot briefer, replacing Ralph Cutshall, who was recently transferred to Wallops Island, Va.

Smith attended Stowe Teachers college and Illinois State university. He spent 22 months on the Arctic ice floe, serving for 10 months as scientific leader in charge of the well known station, which coordinates activities of the Army, Navy, Air Force, weather bureau, geological survey and the government research and development agency.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have a three-year-old daughter, Robyn Kay. Mrs. Smith, a graduate of Stowe Teachers college, has been a professional social worker, including work as a teacher of retarded children.

Also joining the 12-member staff at the weather bureau recently was Herbert Hove, who will work as a meteorological technician. He has been with the bureau since 1955 and attended Washington State university.

He has a wife, Jeanne, and daughter, Holly, 9.

Hove replaces Leo Peart, who is now stationed at Winslow, Ariz.

Two Hospitals on Accredited List

Rogue Valley and Sacred Heart hospitals are among those on the annual list of accredited hospitals published by the joint commission on accreditation of hospitals.

Members of the joint commission are the American College of Physicians, College of Surgeons, American Hospital association and the American Medical association.

Approximately 6,000 hospitals are eligible for accreditation, but Dr. Kenneth B. Babcock, commission director, pointed out that omission of a hospital from the list did not necessarily mean it had failed to pass an accreditation survey.

Only hospitals which request surveys are visited by the commission.

Wreath Ordered in Memory of Neuberger

Salem—(UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield today ordered a wreath of white chrysanthemums placed in the rotunda of the State Capitol building in memory of Sen. Richard L. Neuberger.

Salem—(UPI)—The Southern Pacific Company has been authorized by Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill to withdraw its agent in the unincorporated community of West Scio.

Man Found Guilty Of Assault Charge

Carroll Zachary, 25, Medford, was found guilty by a circuit court jury yesterday of assault and battery.

Circuit Judge Edward C. Kelly suspended imposition of sentence for one year and placed Zachary on probation. The jury had recommended that Zachary dispose of all firearms and not drink any intoxicating liquor.

Since assault and battery is included in the charges of assault with a deadly weapon, the jury was allowed to bring in a verdict on either charge. Zachary was charged originally with assault with a deadly weapon by pointing a .45 caliber pistol at Special Sheriff's Deputy Lonnie Varner during the Jacksonville Jubilee last Aug. 2.

The trial started Monday and went to the jury Tuesday noon.

Medford Firm Gets Building Contract

Work on a new building for the county fairgrounds south of Medford is to start immediately and be finished by July 15, County Commissioner Chester Wendt said today.

With approval of the county fair board, the county court this morning awarded a contract to Don L. Jacobs Construction company, Medford, at a revised estimate of \$73,061.93. Jacobs had submitted the lowest bid of \$82,950.13 last week.

This brings the estimate per square foot cost to \$4.70 for the 15,570 square feet of building. Previous estimate was \$5.33.

The fair board will contribute \$18,000 toward the building and the county the remainder.

Packed Snow on Most Mountain Routes
