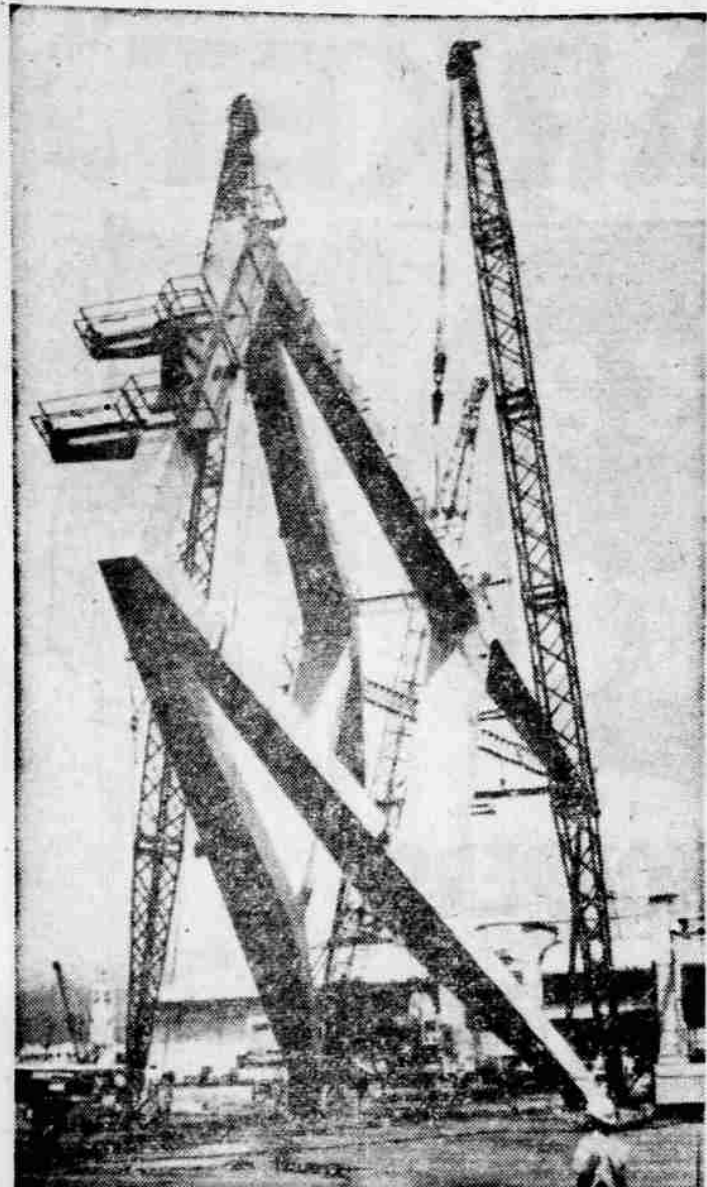

Elections Always Leave Deficit for Oregonians to Pay

Salem - UPI - The state takes in a nice piece of change at election time from filing fees and space sales in the Voter's Pamphlet, but staging the election always puts Oregon in the red.

In the 1958 primary and general elections, for instance, the state took in \$38,495 but the outlay was \$118,557, a clear deficit of \$80,000. Elections Division Chief Jack Thompson says the expense will be greater this year because it's a presidential election year, which always brings out more voters and results in a call for more pamphlets. Also, more people are filing for delegate to the Democratic national convention, and this year's primary pamphlet will be fatter and more costly to print.

The most expensive office to shoot for in terms of paying the state is the U.S. Senate.

You start off with a \$150 filing fee. Then the cost of buying a page in the Voter's Pamphlet is also \$150-limit, two pages.

The tab for filing for eight other jobs, U.S. representative, governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, labor commissioner, public instruction superintendent and Supreme Court justice is \$100.

It graduates down to \$50 for circuit judge, \$20 for district attorney, \$15 for national committeeman and woman and \$10 for legislators.

Page Costs Lower
The \$150-a-page in the voter's booklet is also levied against presidential and vice presidential candidates and those for six other top offices. State senators and below pay \$15 a page.

Thompson says that actually the fees and other charges were never meant to pay for the election. Taxpayers pick up the difference and the pamphlet is free.

"The fees discourage to a degree filing by other than bona fide candidates," he comments. "After all, if it was free, just about everybody would file for something."

Socialist Party Plans to Give Up Last Public Office

Milwaukee, Wis. - UPI - The once-vibrant Socialist party will give up without a fight its last public office in the nation in the April 5 Milwaukee elections.

For 38 of the 60 years in this century, Milwaukee has had Socialist mayors. In every municipal election but one since 1910 there has been a Socialist candidate for mayor. Only three times in that period has the Socialist been defeated.

Irrespective of the outcome of the Wisconsin primary and the April 5 municipal election, the reign of the Social-

ists is in its twilight and there appears to be little chance of a new dawn in the foreseeable future.

Non-Partisan Balloting
The primary and the April 5 balloting will be non-partisan, as every Milwaukee city election since 1912, but Milwaukee's mayors and candidates for the office have made little secret of their party affiliations.

Of the candidates in the primary, two are prominent Democrats, one a well-known Republican and three have no political affiliation. None are Socialists. Incumbent Mayor

Frank Zeidler, a Socialist, waived his chance for a fourth term because of ill health and rejected overtures from his party to become its presidential candidate.

Milwaukee's mayors have been Socialist in name only. None of the appurtenances of public ownership are to be found in the city after the half century in which so-called Socialists have dominated municipal politics.

Many an American city with extremely conservative government has carried out more of the economic changes normally associated with so-

cialism than is to be found in Milwaukee. The gas and electric power companies, the municipal transportation system, are privately owned.

Among the six candidates in the mayoralty race, the three with most chance of election are Rep. Henry S. Reuss (D-Wis.), a three-time congressman, State Senate Minority Leader Henry Maier (D-Milwaukee), and Assistant City Attorney George Bowman, a Republican.

Administration Praised
Both Maier and Reuss have praised Zeidler's administration and those of other Social-

ists for honesty and integrity. Of the three leading candidates, only Bowman has attacked Zeidler's operation.

The Socialist era began in Milwaukee in 1910 when Emil Seidel was elected to a two-year term as mayor, replacing Democrat David S. Rose, who had served from 1896-1906 and from 1908-10.

The last Democrat to serve as mayor of Milwaukee was the first of the non-partisan election winners, Gerhard Bading, 1912-16. Socialist Dan Hoan was elected in 1916 and reelected for a record 24 years. The first Republican mayor

of Milwaukee in this century was the late Carl Zeidler, brother of the Socialist incumbent. Carl Zeidler served two years to 1942 before taking a leave of absence in February, 1942, to accept a Navy commission. He was lost at sea seven months later.

Another Republican, John L. Bohn, became acting mayor in 1942 and was re-elected in 1944. He was replaced by incumbent Frank Zeidler in 1948.
