

British Airliner Has Robot Landing

London—UPI—A new British jet airliner will have an electronic landing system so automatic that all the pilot will have to do is watch.

The makers of the short-range DR-121 airliner—the "Aircro" combine of de Havilland, Fairey Aviation and Hunting Aircraft—say the robot landing equipment is the first ever installed on a commercial airliner.

In its first stage, the landing system will bring the plane automatically to below the present altitude minimum of 200 feet above ground level. By 1970, "Aircro" spokesmen say, it will put the airliner on the runway safely and roll it to a stop automatically.

The DR-121, designed exclusively for hauls up to 1,200 miles, is scheduled to go into service with British European Airways in 1963.

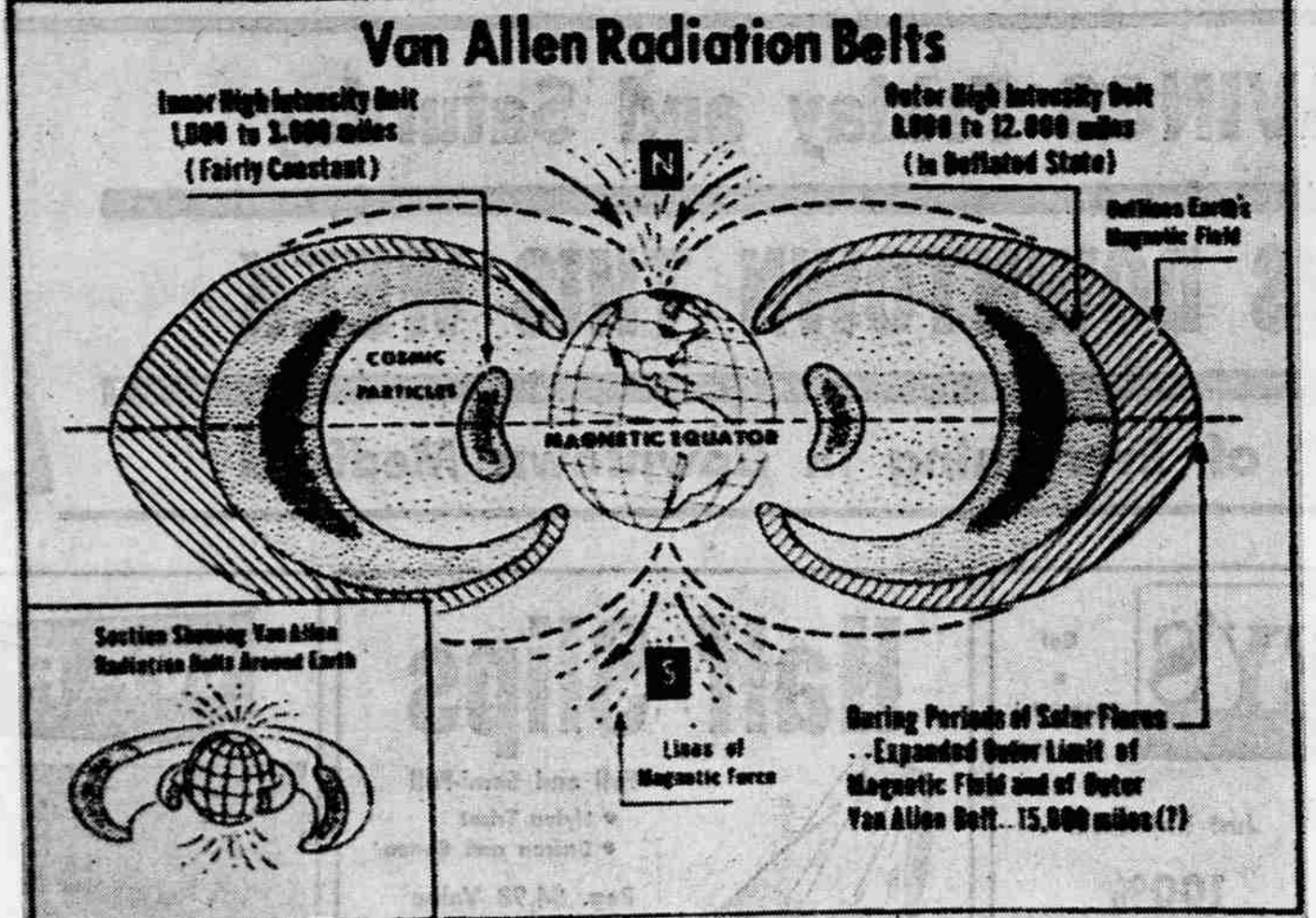

RADIATION BELTS—During 1960 space scientists, including those of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, plan a specialized study of the so-called Van Allen Radiation Belts, to prepare for man's entry into space. At least two huge space vehicles will be launched by NASA, one a Thor-Delta and the other a Juno II, which will put satellites especially equipped to study the Van Allen Belts, into orbit. Other satellites and space problems launched by the United States will carry instrumentation which will aid in the Van Allen study. The Van Allen Belts were given that name after data radioed back from the early Explorer and Pioneer space vehicles, enabled Dr. James A. Van Allen, of the State University of Iowa, to chart these belts of cosmic particles. The earth, like an ordinary magnet, has a magnetic field around it, composed of lines of force traveling out in a loop from one pole to the other. This magnetic field, like a cage around the earth traps cosmic particles and keeps them from showering down on the earth. The above map is an artist's conception of how these Van Allen Belts would appear if one could see them. In the small inset drawing, the Inner Van Allen Belt appears as a wedding ring-like circle around the magnetic equator of

the earth. The outer belt would appear as a giant, fat balloon tire laying on its side with the earth in the center. The larger drawing is a sliced-through cross section of the Van Allen Belts (the two crescents filled with dots, near the earth). At the north and south poles are the lines of magnetic force looping outward, the energy traveling from "S" to "N". The evenly-dashed lines looping out to the outside of the diagonally-striped crescents, from the outline of the earth's magnetic field. The dark areas within the Van Allen Belts indicates concentrations of cosmic radiation. Data evaluated after reception from the satellite Explorer VI has shown that during periods of heavy solar flares, or storms, the outer Van Allen Belt goes through a change. At first, the belt deflates like a punctured balloon, spilling its load of cosmic particles into the space between the Outer Belt and earth. Then, while the solar storm is still in action, it expands again as it traps cosmic particles from the sun. It expands past its original size, filling the magnetic field (diagonally-striped area). Finally it drops back to its original size. The Inner Belt apparently remains unchanged during solar flare activity. (UPI Telephoto)

Stock Slaughter Rules Tightened, Now Effective

Salem — The practice of tossing a few knives into a car and rolling into the country to perform livestock slaughter services is now illegal.

An order of the state department of agriculture, signed Feb. 25 and now effective, sets up facility, sanitation and identification requirements for mobile slaughterers. The last legislature brought the "on wheels" slaughter operators under state license and regulation.

The order is of immediate concern to any traveling operator "who engages in the business of slaughtering meat farm animals for farmers on farms or at any other location."

It requires that equipment must be maintained and operations performed in a sanitary manner, and that carcasses must be stamped with the mobile slaughterer's license number. If transported, they also need the regular producer's tag.

At request of the farmer, mobile operators may transport a carcass to a plant for cutting and wrapping for the farmer, but must leave the carcass at this destination. Offal and hide cannot be hauled in the same vehicle as carcasses.

New "facility" requirements include a covered truck, smooth metal interiors, sterilizing tanks for utensils, a built-in water tank under pressure or a water hose which can be connected to the farm water system.

Regularly licensed slaughterhouses may operate mobile outfits without additional license, but must meet other requirements established in the new order. Copies of the regulation are available from

Chance Discovery Helps Desert Areas

London—UPI—A chance discovery by a British chemist may help make sandy, desert areas into fertile farming land—given enough water.

The agricultural journal "World Crops" said water alone is not enough to make the deserts bloom. Something is needed to trap the water in the soil and convert sand into fertile humus.

That, it said, is what makes the discovery of the chemist—whom it did not name—important. By chance, he applied a mineral called vermuculite to a bare sandy area of waste land. Within a few months, the sand was overgrown with a firm growth of grass.

The journal said vermuculite, a mica-like mineral, works into the fissures of each granule of sand, trapping moisture in the soil. Coarse grass could then be grown, forming a humus soil as it dies.

With it, "World Crops" said, even the Sahara might be made fertile in time.

Snake Hunting Big Business in Texas

Killeen, Tex.—UPI—Want to try your hand at rattlesnake hunting? It's big business in Cooke county, Texas.

Last spring the county set a 50-cent-per-snake bounty and Warden Raymond Taylor said it was enough for some persons to turn professional snake hunters.

Best hunting time is in the fall and early winter months when the snakes have gone into their dens.

Taylor said one hunter collected \$736.50 from October through December. This man, he said, found and killed 62 rattlers under one rock and in one day took 253 sets of rattles. Another day he got 251 sets.

The county paid a total of \$3,921 to hunters in 1959.

Taylor says hunters drive the snakes out of their dens during cold weather by spraying the dens with gasoline. Then as the snakes crawl out for fresh air, hunters chop off their heads with sharp hoes.
