Trees . . .

 (Editor's note: The following comments on trees, particularly those adaptable to street use in Medford, have been prepared by John Gribble, well-known retired forester, and will be run in a series during the 'tree planting season' here, now under way.)

Sweet gum (Liquidambar styraciflua) is a pyramidal, symmetrical, tall and straight tree, mostly a native of the southeastern states. The reddish-brown, stout branches are sometimes corky-ridged. The pointed buds are shiny reddish-brown and fragrant when crushed. The leaves are somewhat star-shaped, heart shaped at the base, 4 to 7 inches long and broad. They are 5 to 7 lobed, finely toothed and lustrous, sometimes mistaken for maple or sycamore leaves. Autumn colorings are wonderful—brownish yellow-red, scarlet, some bluish-black, and shiny. This must be seen to be appreciated.

Two nice specimens of this tree are near the northeast area of the county courthouse yard, and a row of younger trees are south of the courthouse. Watch them grow! Spraying water in early fall produces more vivid leaf-coloring. Trees should be transplanted in the spring and severely pruned, which insures chances of survival. It does best on deep soil, in full sunlight.

The sweet gum should be used more where it can be given ample space. Streets where used are: Black Oak, (75 to 85 feet apart); Country Club drive, (75-85 feet); Grand, (one to a lot); Hawthorne (on property as it fits); Pennsylvania, (Oakdale to Rose, 40 to 50 feet apart); Siskiyou, (Highland to east end-70 to 80 feet); Siskiyou,

New York —(UPI)—Business will expand at a slower rate than recently forecast for the first half of the year, but there will be much less decline in the second half, according to Alfred L. Vanden Broeck & Co.
 The speed with which inventories accumulated since the end of the steel strike and the plethora of publicity surrounding it brought fears sufficient to cause businessmen to reduce their own firms' immediate requirements, the brokerage house points out.
 "It appears that except for automobile retailers' stocks, inventories are less than might be expected from historical inventory — sales relationship . . . and that one may assume without undue optimism that by midyear requirements will no longer be deferrable."
 Purcell & Co. recommends ABC Vending, which ignored the sharp sell off both on Thursday and Friday last week. "Often, action of this sort indicates strength that later develops in an upward move in the stock."

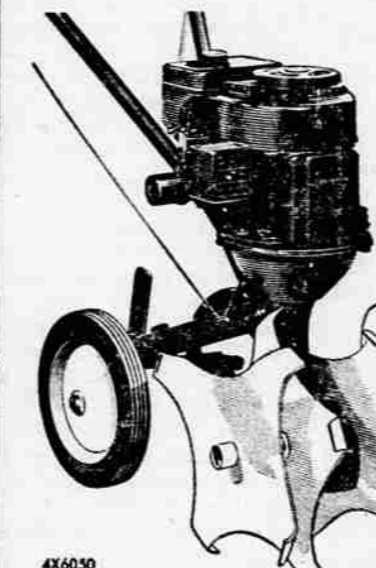

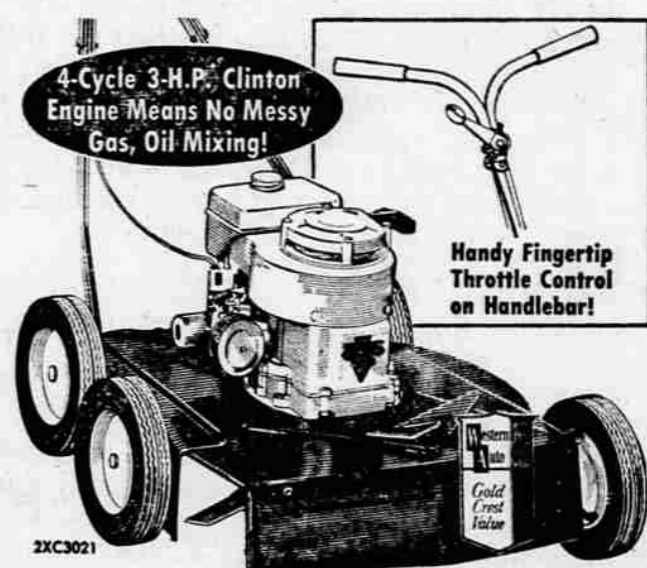
