The material for this composition was gathered by Dvorak, a Bohemian, when he taught at the New England conservatory, and some passages are based on American folk tunes.

The main theme of the Second movement Americans recognize as "Goin' Home." It is first heard as a solo for the English horn, and is also heard throughout the movement in various instruments. The Fourth movement also has some familiar snatches of folk tunes.

The second "Peer Gynt Suite" by the Norwegian composer, Edvard Grieg, is also on the program.
