

Black Tornado Leaves for Eugene; Will Face Jesuit In Wednesday Night Action

On the spot, the Medford High school basketball squad headed for Eugene today. As champions of the Southern Oregon conference, District 6, the Black Tornado will enter the Oregon Class A-1 tournament. Prognosticators have placed on the Tornadoes the burden of the favored role. While the tourney opens with two conflicts tonight, Medford does not see its first action until 8:45 p.m. on Wednesday. It goes against Jesuit, runnerup in the Wilco league, District 2.

The 10 men who'll carry the Medford banner include seven who saw the bulk of duty through the 1959-1960 regular slate. They are all-stater Jerry Anderson, Jerry Shults, Lowell Dean, Dick Ragsdale, Ken Durkee, Bob Quinney and Booth Deakins, Calvin Dean, Jim Barry and Darrell Miller round out the squad.

22nd contingent to represent Medford in the hoop classic, the most colorful event of the state's prep sports year. They face a man-sized task. For in the Oregon cage extravaganza, while upsets are not the rule, they are not exceptions either. Medford teams have just twice won the state diadem, in 1924 and 1929. They have been in the finals on four other occasions, in 1928, 1939, 1955 and 1956.

The Black Tornado aggregation went north ambitious to add luster to Medford laurels and improve on its 1959 showing. Last March the Tornado fell to St. Helens in the consolation finals and finished eighth in the tourney standings. Some six members of the Medford squad are back for a second effort.

Frank Roelandt, who coached the club to conference honors, summed up the team attitude when he said, "We'll give it a good try."

Roelandt likely will call upon Anderson, Shults, Lowell Dean, Ragsdale and Durkee as his starting five but Quinney could start in place of Shults or Dean.

Those likely to open for Coach Jerry Dade's Jesuit Crusaders are Bernie Albers, Billy Wehrly, Bruce Moore, Tim Gearin and Ramon Demartini.

Cal and Lowell Dean and Ken Durkee, all-conference diamonders, and Dick Ragsdale, Bob Quinney, Jerry Anderson, Jim Barry and Ken Jensen have been with the varsity basketball squad. Jensen turned out for baseball last week and all others are expected to be on hand by March 21, when school resumes.

Pat McLoughlin and Herb Wheeler are letter-winning pitchers back along with Anderson, Ray Konopasek, infielder, and Wayne Thompson and Mike Parsons, outfielders, are players who saw quite a bit of duty.

The two Deans, Durkee and Konopasek have been infield regulars for two years and Kovenz rates the crew as one of the best infields in the state. Ragsdale, Quinney and Ray Stewart are expected to back them up.

Catchers are Jensen, Barry and Art Ruhl. Jensen caught regularly as a sophomore and saw much duty in the outfield last year. Barry also can play the outfield and Anderson, when not pitching, Thompson, Parsons, Ragsdale, Ken Adams and Bob Constance are others ticketed for outfield service.

Quinney also has pitching capabilities. Borrowed by the Crater Cubs of Central Point last summer, he pitched two victories for that team on its way to the Oregon Junior Baseball association championship.

David Douglas To Meet Pirates In A-1 Action

Eugene — (UPI) — Marshfield meets David Douglas and Albany tangles with Portland tonight as the 16-team state class A-1 tournament opens five days of action to seek a new state champion.

Franklin, last year's king, failed to make the grade to return this year.

Marshfield, ranked number two in the United Press International poll, and Medford, ranked number one, are rated as the teams to beat. If form is followed they will clash Saturday night for the title. But form often has been thrown out the window in this prep extravaganza.

Dortch Scoring Champ
The Marshfield-David Douglas matches 6-10 Mel Counts of the Pirates against David Douglas' Jim Dortch, scoring champ of the Metro league.

Cleveland is in the tourney for the first time since 1955 and finished with a 17-5 record. The Portland club ranked third in the final UPI poll. Albany is led by six-foot Gary Moye.

Jesuit, Lake Oswego and David Douglas are in the tourney for the first time.

The rest of the field sees action Wednesday with Oswego meeting La Grande Klamath Falls playing Sandy; Beaverton facing South Eugene; Jefferson playing South Salem; Hermiston up against St. Helens and Jesuit facing mighty Medford.

Bradley To Meet Dayton In NIT Game

New York — (UPI) — Top-seeded Bradley and streaking St. Bonaventure are favored to win quarter-final games in the National Invitational Basketball Tournament tonight before an expected capacity crowd of 18,000 at Madison Square Garden.

Bradley, 24-2 was listed a first-point choice in the night's first game over Dayton 21-6, the NIT "bridesmaid" which has lost in the final round five times.

St. Bonaventure 20-3 puts its 17-game winning streak on the line as a one-point favorite over fourth-seeded St. John's, the defending champions whom the Bonnies trounced, 95-78, during last December's Holiday Festival Tourney on the same court.

Tonight's winners will collide in a semi-final game Thursday night, when Providence and second-seeded Utah State clash in the other.

Garcia Hurls Three Scoreless Innings

Longer shots have paid off so Manager Al Lopez of the Chicago White Sox is viewing "old man" Mike Garcia with renewed interest.

Rival managers may think Lopez is dreaming but perhaps that's the right of a manager who's seen his team chalk up three straight Grapefruit League wins.

"We think Mike has a lot left in him," said Lopez after the 36-year-old "bear" spun three scoreless innings in an 8-4 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals Monday. "And his first real outing of the spring certainly didn't do anything to discourage us."

Wynn Hit Hard
Garcia's performance was especially impressive because it came after 22-game winner Early Wynn was racked up in a three-run third-inning rally and 14-game winner Billy Pierce also was rought up by the Cardinals. Big Mike took over the score 7-4 and slammed down the lid on the Cardinals the remainder of the distance.

"Go go" boys Luis Aparicio and Jim Landis both scored on an outfield fly in the first inning to put the White Sox in front, 2-0. Al Smith also starred for the American League champions, driving in four runs with a triple and a single.

Musial Doubles
The Cardinals, who have lost two of their three exhibition games, had something to cheer about when Stan Musial doubled off Pierce in the sixth inning to drive in St. Louis' last run.

Garcia had only a 3-6 record for the Indians last season but Lopez says the one-time 20-game winning right-hander could be an important addition to his bullpen corps. The White Sox already have the strongest relief corps in the league in Gerry Staley and Turk Lown.

McNeeley Impressive In Fight

Boston — (UPI) — Young Tom McNeeley's impressive showing in his first real ring test established him today as a heavyweight to be reckoned with.

The 23-year-old Arlington, Mass., slugger chalked up his 17th consecutive victory in a 21-month pro career Monday night, beating veteran Willi Besmanoff, 195, of Milwaukee, Wis., at the Garden.

McNeeley, 198, bulled his stocky German-born opponent through the ropes twice in the 10th and final round. The first knockdown resulted in a mandatory eight count but there was no count on the second.

McNeeley was a slight underdog going into the fight, probably because of his lack of experience in comparison to Besmanoff who now has a 47-18-7 record and has never been knocked out. He was McNeeley's first "name" opponent.

Oregon Coach Goes To Dallas

Eugene — (UPI) — Brad Ecklund, assistant football coach at the University of Oregon, resigned Monday to accept a position with Dallas of the National Football League.

Ecklund, a one-time star center at Oregon, leaves late this month to start work under Coach Tom Landry of Dallas.

He coached at Gresham and Roseburg high schools and also played pro football for Dallas, New York and Baltimore.

Coach Len Casanova said he would name a new assistant to replace Ecklund soon.

Champ Beat By Unknown

Caracas, Venezuela — (UPI) — If you're a world champion, stay out of South America.

Last December, welterweight king Don Jordan of Los Angeles traveled to Buenos Aires for a non-title bout with Federico Thompson of Argentina and suffered an upset, fourth-round knockout.

Monday night, featherweight champion Davey Moore met a 21-year-old Venezuelan scrapper named Carlos Hernandez in a non-title fight at Caracas and absorbed the first knockout loss of his career.

Hernandez, unbeaten and unranked, floored Moore six times and fractured the jaw of the champion from Springfield, Ohio, on his way to a seventh round TKO.

Moore went into the ring as a strong favorite—even in Caracas—and emerged with the worst licking of his career.

Hernandez, who weighed 130 pounds to Moore's 127, scored his first two knockdowns in the third round. The second time he hit the canvas, Davey was saved by the bell.

Robertson on Writers' Team

New York — (UPI) — Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati and Tom Stith of St. Bonaventure, the nation's two top scorers, headed the 10-man All-American team chosen today by the United States Basketball Writers association.

The selections, announced in the new issue of Look Magazine, also picked Jerry Lucas of Ohio State, Darrall Imhoff of California, Jerry West of West Virginia, Lenny Wilkens of Providence, Lee Shaffer of North Carolina, Walt Bellamy of Indiana, Roger Kelsey of Georgia Tech, and Terry Dischinger of Purdue.

Robertson was described as "the perfect basketball player" by the selection committee and was almost unanimous first choice in the balloting.
