## Prospect of Chiang Making Journey To United States Slim

Taipei -UPI- Some of his best friends are saying that Nationalist Chinese President Chiang Kai-shek should visit the United States and other nations friendly to Formosa in an effort to repair his diplomatic fences.  
But the prospects of his making such a trip are small indeed.  
Many Americans in Taipei believe that the 72-year-old Generalissimo is his country's best salesman and that he may be harming his government's international prestige by living behind a silken curtain.  
Foreign visitors who meet Chiang in his closely guarded office often come away impressed by the force of his personality and intellect.  
A Philippine cabinet official told newsmen recently he was almost hypnotized by the strength of Chiang's eyes and general bearing.  
**Mind Still Alert**  
Americans in Taipei have said that some influential people in the United States probably think of Chiang as a doddering old man basking in the glory of past victories.  
But most visitors who have met Chiang gain the impression that he still possesses an alert mind and the dynamic qualities of leadership and persuasion.  
Those favoring a Chiang trip abroad believe that it would inflame a Nationalist stock where he was not.  
They say that with little effort the Generalissimo could undermine opinions that the Nationalists are decaying under a Taipei leader.  
The Taipei newspaper China News said recently "it might be well for the National Leader to make a trip to the United States and Free Asian nations to win more support to the cause of freedom."  
"As we are entering into a period when imposing world politics is being conducted through personal diplomacy, the time may be ripe for the President to consider a tour to meet with other world leaders and exchange views on broad issues."  
But informed quarters doubt that the government is even considering a Chiang tour.  
Some sources state that the Generalissimo will never leave Formosa unless it is to recapture the China mainland.  
Chiang himself has said that he would not visit the United States until he can defeat the Communists.  
Although Chiang's statement was not so explicit as to preclude any exceptions, several theories are advanced to rule out a Chiang trip.  
**Shielded By Aides**  
One school of thought holds that the Generalissimo is now living above and beyond criticism of any type.  
He is shielded by aides from critics outside the country, while public criticism of the President on Formosa itself simply does not exist.

**Legislators To Study Device For Auto Fumes**  
Washington - (Science Service) - A House of Representatives health subcommittee will study a simple, inexpensive way to reduce air pollution with an automobile device that has nothing to do with the exhaust system.  
The device is a pipe that a handy mechanic could make. It goes into the breather pipe of the crankcase. This breather pipe under the hood had been relatively ignored while engineers sought a way to cut down on unburned hydrocarbons in auto exhausts with experimental after-burners and catalytic converters.  
But now the breather pipe has been identified as a major emitter of hydrocarbons from gasoline.  
**Hydrocarbons Returned**  
The new pipe returns these hydrocarbons to the engine for burning.  
A device the Public Health Service has been testing has been estimated to cost \$1.99. Rep. Kenneth Roberts (D-Ala.) and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) have referred to a model that could cost a dollar or less factory-installed in new cars.  
The president of the Automobile Manufacturers association, L. L. Colbert, has indicated the device could be offered as optional equipment on all 1961 cars and as standard equipment on all cars delivered in California.  
There are no patent problems because automobile manufacturers have agreed to share all devices to reduce air pollution.  
The pipe, however, is only a beginning. It is thought to reduce the total amount of hydrocarbons emitted by an engine by about 33 per cent to 40 per cent. It may have no effect on specific hydrocarbons found in exhaust gases and suspected of producing cancer.  
**Good Running Order Needed**  
Greater reduction of hydrocarbons - by as much as two-thirds - would result if motorists kept their cars in good running order, a Chrysler Corporation study shows. Chrysler engineers compared the exhaust gases of 300 Los Angeles cars chosen at random with their own fleet of cars, which receive a complete motor tune-up each 5,000 miles.  
(The engineers also found that proper maintenance would improve fuel economy from 15 per cent to 20 per cent.)  
As for the status of devices that reduce the amount of hydrocarbons from cars' exhaust pipes, some of these are reported to remove from 80 per cent to 90 per cent. But the cost ranges from \$100 upwards per unit.

**Blood Vessels May Dilate in Attack**  
Los Angeles - (Science Service) - The shock that follows an acute heart attack may be due to a disturbance in the blood vessels, preliminary observations with a new procedure indicate.  
The vessels may actually dilate rather than constrict, three investigators reported. It was once believed that development of shock was related entirely to the severity of heart damage.  
The new procedure consists of a mobile unit, wheeled to a patient's bedside shortly after an attack. Drs. Maxwell J. Binder, L. E. Scaduto and Morton L. Pearce of the University of California Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Center here said. A green dye technique measures the heart's output and blood pressure measurements are taken. So far, 22 patients have been studied with the device 24 to 48 hours after their attack. Surviving patients are re-studied when they are fully ambulant.

## Mrs. Kyle Named GOP Club Head

Mrs. Richard Kyle, 42 South Keene Way, was elected president of the Jackson County Young Republican club recently. She succeeds Mrs. Joseph D. Walsh, who submitted her resignation at the monthly meeting.  
Medford Lawyer John R. Dellenback, in an informal talk, defined the basic purpose of U.S. government as "accomplishing for all of us what we need to have done, but cannot do for ourselves."  
"A government which claims it is serving us by doing more and more for us will ultimately become our master unless stopped," he declared, "because it will be able to control us by threatening to stop supplying these needs which are vital to us."  
Dellenback asserted that "government should protect us in our basic right to equal opportunity, without at the same time shackling us with laws which take away our freedom." It should not, he said, "protect us against someone punching us in the nose by tying up everyone's arms, including our own."  
Plans were discussed for a fund-raising dance to be held at Republican campaign headquarters. James Ragland and Don Stathos were named co-chairman for the spring event. Visitors included two representatives of the newly organized Young Oregon College.

## Copper Believed Headed for Period Of Price Stability

New York -UPI- Copper, which has lost several key markets because of gyrating prices, now seems headed for a period of price stability.  
This appeared certain when Phelps Dodge, nation's second largest producer, announced it would join other producers in holding the price line at 33 cents a pound, despite the shortage of copper due to long mine strikes, most of which are now ended.  
"American Metal Market," daily newspaper of the metals industry, points out that the decision to hold the price line could have several underlying causes.  
**Demand Lacking**  
One is that there simply isn't a pressing demand for copper, indicating that business in 1960 might not soar quite so high nor so fast as had been expected. For as the most price-sensitive of all major metals, copper has long been regarded as a key barometer of the nation's economy.  
However, the daily metals newspaper says that there may be other, and less discouraging factors behind the hold-the-line policy.  
One could be a new and aggressive stand on the part of the producers against the market inroads made by more stably-priced metals such as aluminum, which has eaten into copper's markets in high voltage overhead cable, hardware, roofing, ornamental architecture and tubing.  
**Battle on Imports**  
Another factor tending to keep price steady is that brass mills, major users of raw copper, are now in a knock-out battle with foreign mill imports, and in many cases are finding it necessary to cut their own prices in order to compete.  
In any event, when domestic prices stayed level last week, despite a sudden jump in the London Metals Exchange, the decision to keep U.S. prices stable began to look more and more like a conscious industry policy.  
The Aluminum industry, while its own markets are under attack by magnesium and plastics, still anticipates a 12 to 13 per cent increase in demand in 1960.  
But until actual market requirements come more sharply into focus, the primary producers, who provide about 70 per cent of new supplies, are planning only a six per cent increase over 1959 production.  
**To Increase Output**  
The rest of the increased demand will be made up in part by the secondary producers, who make aluminum from scrap. According to American Metals Market, they plan to increase output by about 15 per cent.  
Imports of crude aluminum, which dropped some six per cent last year, to about 240,000 tons, are expected to show a 16 per cent increase this year. This increase, however, may be largely offset by increased exports from the United States.  
According to American Metal Market, the best estimates of total available aluminum supply from all three sources range around 2,880,000 tons this year, as against 2,650,000 tons in 1959.
