Northwest Power Needs Expected To Double In Decade

Portland - (UPI) - Bonneville Power Administration said Tuesday that its Pacific Northwest power requirements are expected to double during the coming 10-year period.

BPA compiled its annual forecast of requirements and resources in cooperation with the Northwest Power Pool members and power distributors of the region.

Could Meet Firm Loads It said that all firm power loads could be met from resources of the U.S. Columbia river system even under critical water conditions through the next decade. Private utility requirements above their own steam and hydroelectric resources can be met through 1963-64 under critical water conditions, the report said.

Both urban and rural domestic customers are expected to reflect a declining rate of population growth but growth in use per consumer is expected to rise without interruption, BPA said. It said effect of rising standards of living and low rates, stimulating use of electrical appliances, was shown by an increase from 5,000 kilowatt-hours average use in 1950 to 8,500 in 1958.

Industry Growth Slowed Average consumer use is expected to reach 14,000 kilowatt-hours by 1969.

BPA's report said the growth rate of large industries, particularly electro-process plants, has slowed during the past decade. But it said resource-based industries serving markets outside the region are expected to continue a rapid expansion. These include phosphorus, pulp, paper, plywood, chemical and similar industries.

Industries such as fertilizers, petroleum and steel are expected to contribute heavily to power requirements in the next 10 years. Possibilities for industrial expansion not included in estimated power requirements are aluminum reduction from local clays, pumping for natural gas pipelines and production of titanium, zirconium and ferroalloys.

Projects Being Built BPA said power resources of the Columbia River system with an installed capacity of 5,721,250 kilowatts as of June 30, 1959, would add 2,097,400

Important Incidents in Life of Savior Assigned Commemoration

The changes in the seasons of the year bring modification in our thinking and our habits of life. In a corresponding manner the important incidents in the life of our divine Saviour are assigned for commemoration in these respective seasons.

The pivotal point in the ecclesiastical calendar is Easter which is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox. Thus it is a fixed and determined law of the planets that dictates the date of Easter - the Feast of the Resurrection. This is a movable feast depending upon the moon.

The Resurrection is preceded by six Sundays and 40 days which is called the season of Lent. These are called days of penance, which is manifested in the restriction of food taken; when practices of prayer are enriched, festive occasions are minimized. These are days of deeper reflection as men study and rehearse the many interesting and instructive incidents of the public life of our Saviour, culminating with the passion of Christ and the glory of His Resurrection on Easter Sunday.

The season of Lent gives opportunity and occasion for serious thinking and for the enhancement of our knowledge of God and the recognition of His goodness to us. We join in prayer for conversation with Almighty God on the problems of life, and in the examination of our conduct with the example of our Saviour that He would wish us to follow.

Lent is thus a precious period, and in reality a season of spiritual joy that offers wholesome contrast to worldly indulgence.

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Boysenberries Should Be Sprayed

Growers who have not sprayed boysenberries should do so as soon as possible, according to Don Berry, county extension agent.

One quart of liquid lime sulphur should be used in 3 gallons of water. If spray is applied now it will help to control the cane spot diseases along with anthracnose, mildew and blight, the county agent said.

A second spray should be applied when the canes are on the trellis and new shoots are one to two inches long. The second spray is necessary especially when there is trouble with the berries not fully ripening or when they are red on one side, Berry explained.

WHERE WATER GOES

Chicago - (UPI) - Probably less than 5 per cent of the 300 billion gallons of water used daily in the United States is consumed in household operations, the Nalco Chemical Corp. reported. More water is used for industrial and power generation than any other, some 46 per cent, while agricultural irrigation accounts for the largest share of the remaining 54 per cent.

Detroit - At a 40-mile an hour cruising speed the average fuel economy of 29 different makes of automobiles was increased by about 40 per cent in the two decades from 1930 to 1950.

FOR BETTER BUTTS

Washington - (UPI) - More than \$314 million has been spent by the American tobacco industry during the past nine years for new and improved manufacturing, processing and research facilities, the Tobacco Institute reported. An additional \$80 million is so far planned for similar work in 1960 and 1961. Included in the improvement program to date is an item of more than \$164 million for new machinery, or more than half the total outlay.

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
