Clerks in Area Notified of Union Bargaining Agent

The Retail Clerks Union, AFL-CIO, was notified by the national labor relations board today that the union has been certified as the bargaining agent for the more than 200 retail clerks in the Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass area.

The clerks voted 98 to 79 in favor of the Retail Clerks Union at an election Feb. 24. They dropped their bargaining representation through the Teamsters Union, Local 962.

Dan Parker, Medford, international representative for Retail Clerks, reported that the NLRB had dismissed all five charges filed by the Teamsters in protest of the election.

Parker said he was "moving at once to bring in the federal mediation and conciliation service to start and complete negotiations for a new contract as quickly as possible."

Demands to be made by the clerks, he said, will include improved health and welfare program, "reasonable increase in wages," improved fringe benefits, and increased vacation, evening and Sunday benefits.

Union representatives will negotiate with Harold E. Carlson, Portland, and Fred Moran, Medford, secretary-treasurer of Medford Builders Exchange Industry Council, representing independent employers; E. R. Johnson, Portland, Safeway representative; and at least one other employer representative, Parker reported.

Hatfield, Welfare Group Discuss Moving Office

Salem - UPI - Gov. Mark Hatfield met with the Public Welfare Commission Wednesday and one of the subjects discussed was the governor's suggestion that public welfare headquarters be moved from Portland to Salem.

Jeanne Jewett, welfare administrator, reported on a survey taken among the 155 employees in Portland who would be affected by the move.

She said first indications are that about half of the employees are against the move. She said about half of those questioned are home-owners.

Topic Not Discussed
Hatfield has proposed that the welfare department could be housed in the state's new Labor and Industries building in the Capital Mall, due for completion in the spring of next year.

The controversial topic of sterilization of unwed mothers on public welfare did not come up for discussion at the meeting.

The subject had been discussed at a meeting between the governor and the Commission last fall and brought on an exchange of heated remarks recently between Oregon Democratic Chairman Robert Straub and Hatfield aides.

Historic Shipyard Destroyed

Sausalito, Calif. - UPI - A spectacular fire Wednesday destroyed the historic, block-long Madden and Lewis shipyard, a ceramics plant and a

\$10,000 pleasure cruiser on the scenic Sausalito waterfront.

The blaze, of undetermined origin, broke out in the ship-

yard, containing the cruiser, and spread to the ceramic shop and small shipyard buildings, causing damage set at about \$750,000.

Flames, fed by paint, shot 200 feet high. They attracted hundreds of spectators and slowed traffic on Waldo Grade where motorists stopped to watch.

Black billows of smoke poured across the Golden Gate Bridge and the mouth of San Francisco Bay.

Fire Chief Matthew Perry said 250 men and volunteers battled for more than an hour before bringing the fire under control.

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Neuberger Seashore Bills Introduced in Senate, House

Washington - Identical bills authorizing the Richard L. Neuberger National Seashore on the Oregon coast were introduced Wednesday by both parties' assistant leaders in the Senate and by Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) in the House.

Rep. Porter said the refined bill contained these features: 1. Generally, it conforms to the area previously suggested by the national park service, but reduced somewhat chiefly in the area of Tahkenitch lake.

2. The Crown-Zellerbach tree farm would be trimmed so that 1500 acres instead of 2600 acres of it would be included in the park. A clause stipulates that if the acreage outside the park is subsequently utilized for other purposes, the government has first option to purchase it for the park.

3. The park includes the Ten Mile creek area, as Reedsport people requested.

4. Federal payments in lieu of taxes for supporting schools and other local functions would be authorized in gradually diminishing amounts over a period of years.

5. Residential property owners could stay on 25 years, or until the death of the husband or wife or until their youngest child reaches 21, whichever is later. Commercial property owners would have 25 years, during which period they could lease to other operators.

6. Any relocation of highway 101 would be at federal expense.

7. Water under the dunes could be used for industrial purposes if it didn't interfere with recreation purposes of the seashore.

8. Tahkenitch lake would be excluded.

Porter said the senator's widow, Maurine, had told him she thought her husband would have felt highly honored by such a memorial.

Neuberger's Last Word
Porter said this bill, a refinement of proposals made by Gov. Mark Hatfield's resources committee and the national park service, is not "the last word" as to specific terms. He said Oregonians will have plenty of time in coming months to express their views as to further modifications before House and Senate committees complete hearings on the legislation.

The key to the dispute was whether de Gaulle would act on the demand of a majority of National Assembly deputies and call an emergency session to debate the farm issue.

'Disillusionment'
The deputies' demand, issued formally Wednesday, represented a note of "disillusionment" with the way de Gaulle has handled the government since Parliament gave him the one-year right to rule by decree. This power was given to de Gaulle following the Algerian settlers' insurrection last January.

An emergency session would cause grave political embarrassment at a time when de Gaulle seeks to convince Khrushchev of his strong position within France, as well as the Western Alliance.

Khrushchev is due here next Wednesday.

Volcano Erupts In New Guinea

Port Moresby, New Guinea - UPI - The volcano on Manam Island, nine miles northeast of New Guinea, erupted with a shattering roar today.

First reports reaching here gave few details.

There was no immediate information on the fate of the 4,000 native residents of the six-mile long island.

Friends Propose Monument for Sen. Neuberger

Washington - UPI - Friends of the late Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) a conservationist and outdoorsman, added today to proposals for a permanent monument to his memory.

Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) joined Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) and Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) in introducing a bill to name the proposed National Seashore park area in southwest Oregon after Neuberger.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) introduced legislation to rename John Day lock and dam on the Columbia river after the senator.

Earlier this week, Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) introduced a bill to rename Green Peter dam in Oregon after Neuberger.

Morse told the senate that naming John Day dam for Neuberger would be a fitting tribute because Neuberger was an active campaigner in Congress for funds to build the project.

In a House speech, Porter said the seashore idea was proposed because the bill to create the "Oregon Dunes" park was "one of the major pieces of work in which Senator Neuberger was engaged at the time of his death."

Grand Ronde Sale Planned by Firm

Longview, Wash. - UPI - International Paper Co., has announced plans to sell the original townsite of Grand Ronde, Ore. located on Highway 18 in Polk county.

The site includes 29 homes and 10 lots, streets, water and sewers.

The town was, for many years, headquarters for logging operations for the Long-Bell Lumber Co. before the firm's merger into the larger corporation, International, to continue to operate its Grande Ronde tree farm.
