Care of Persons Taking Anticoagulant Type of Drug

Nowadays, with thousands of persons taking a cumarin type of drug to keep their blood from clotting in their heart or brain or legs, many write to ask questions which their doctors have not taken the time to answer. One woman writes to say that on taking the drug she has started to bleed from her bow and lungs. She telephoned her doctor, but he was on vacation. What is she to do? Most certainly she should stop taking the medicine; she should call another doctor, and ask that he immediately give her some vitamin K to stop the tendency of bleeding. Another person, a man, writes to say that he is taking the anticoagulant drug, and his urine is now red with blood. He telephoned his doctor to ask about this and the nurse gave him an appointment to come in 10 days. This delay seems to me unwise. If a patient of mine were bleeding in that way I would want him immediately to stop taking the drug, and I would want to see him right off.

Peas Soaked in Water Produce Abnormal Plants

London (Science Service)-Peas planted directly in moist soil produce a higher percentage of healthy plants than peas soaked in water for 48 hours before planting. Experiments by Alex. M. Berrie of the University of Glasgow, Scotland, and described in the British scientific journal Nature indicate that the normal course of development in the pea can be altered by exposing the seed during germination to conditions that affect oxygen respiration. Four sets planted four sets of peas of about 200 each. One set had been soaked in running water, another in stagnant water, a third batch had been exposed to an atmosphere of 20 per cent carbon monoxide. The fourth set was planted directly in moist soil. He found that those subjected to running water produced 175 seedlings, five of which were abnormal. Those exposed to carbon monoxide yielded 171 seedlings, nine of which were abnormal. The peas that had been soaked in stagnant water produced 129 seedlings, including 34 abnormal ones, and the directly planted peas produced 161 seedlings, seven of which were abnormal. Fewer Seedlings The peas soaked in stagnant water, therefore, yielded fewer seedlings and a higher percentage of abnormality. Abnormal seedlings may be due to one or more of the following reasons, the researcher reported: 1. A disturbance of the normal metabolism during the first 48 hours of germination. 2. The removal by leaching of an essential water-soluble metabolite. 3. The accumulation within the seed of a material that adversely affects growth.

Flu Death Rate Said Continuing

Washington (Science Service) - The number of deaths in the U. S. due to Asian flu and other illnesses has hit a new peak and appears to be continuing. Latest data from the National Office of Vital Statistics reveal that mortality from all causes was not only higher than expected for the seventh consecutive week, but the highest to date this year. These figures show that 6,096 persons have died between Jan. 1 and Feb. 20 of this year, as compared with 3,769 at this time last year. The peak week ending Feb. 20 took a total of 1,026 lives compared with 508 for the same week last year. The incidence of influenza alone appears to be declining across the country. Many of the deaths are presumably due to diseases of the heart and blood vessels, Dr. C. C. Daur, medical adviser for this office of the U. S. Public Health Service, explained.

Automatic Pool To Train Skin Divers

San Diego, Calif. (Science Service)-To help train undersea explorers, a diving pool with automatic controls to imitate ocean conditions will be built at Scripps Institution of Oceanography, La Jolla, Calif. In this new aqualung training facility, Conrad Limbaugh, the head of Scripps diving program, explained, controls will automatically adjust the temperature and turbulence of the pool that will train divers for science. The pool will be the University of California's only diver training facility. Students from various University of California campuses will use the pool to gain skin diving skill for research projects. The \$160,000 diving facilities, including pool, towing tank and laboratory structures, were designed by Aerojet-General corporation for the University of California.

Should Ruptures Be Operated On?

Many men write to ask if they should have their ruptures operated on. I cannot answer, because I do not know enough about the man's circumstances. If he is young; if his ruptures are constantly getting larger; if his work requires lifting and straining, if a truss is not holding well, and especially if the man works perhaps at sea or in a wilderness where he cannot always get to a surgeon quickly—in case his rupture should come down and get stuck—he had better get quickly and be operated on. If he is old, he may lose his life, or he may be like a rancher friend of mine who suffered all of his life with two large ruptures—and then had to get them operated on when he was old. Some men want to know if they should try the injection treatment, but I certainly wouldn't have it used on me. The only wise thing to do is to get a good surgeon to cut in and repair the weak places in the abdominal wall. The rupture sack should be removed, and the separated muscles should be brought together properly. It is important that a man not wait until the rupture gets so big that muscle fibers are almost all gone. Sometimes, then, the surgeon has to repair the defect with wire gauze. Also, a man with big hernias will probably be wise not to wait until he has to be operated on when he is old, or when he has a bad heart, or a bad pair of lungs, which cannot stand an anesthetic. In every case, the man should take the advice of a wise and conservative surgeon who will be able to decide if the man must have the operation, or if he had better put it off.

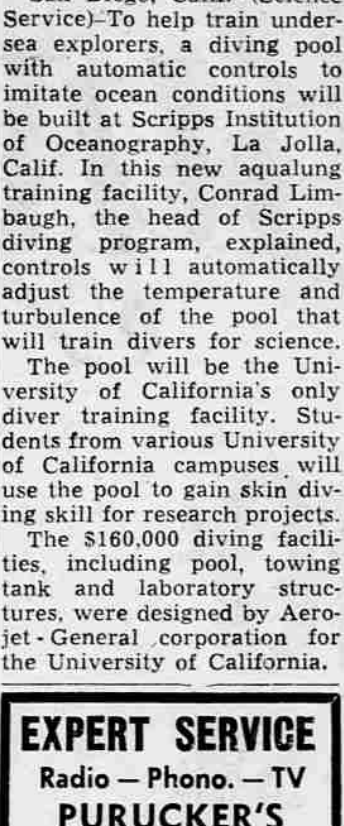
