

St. Francis Captures A-2 Crown With 51-40 Victory

Coos Bay—UPI—St. Francis of Eugene, expected to finish among the also rans when the class A-2 basketball tourney started Monday, today proudly held the 1960 state title.

Coach Jim Souza's team won the crown by handing Willamina a 51-40 defeat Wednesday night. In 1959 St. Francis finished second in the state.

Myrtle Point edged Vale 50-49 for third place and Reedsport beat Myrtle Creek 71-55 for consolation honors.

St. Francis had to overcome a case of first-half jitters to defeat Willamina. The Eugene club was behind 9-0 at one point. It was 13-6 at the quarter and 25-18 at the half for Willamina.

Then Tom Spies, Don Carson and Steve Cottinair began hitting in the second half. A furious third-quarter rally put St. Francis ahead 39-32. Cottinair got 12 of his 14 points in that period. Then the Saints went ahead to wrap it up.

Vale Has Heartbreaker

Carson scored 16 points. Cottinair 14 and Spies, picked to be the all-state team, had 10. Ed Larson scored 10 for Willamina.

Vale and Myrtle Point, who many expected to battle it out for the title, put on a rousing finish. Tom Curry scored the winning bucket for Myrtle Point with 4 seconds to play but it then fouled Rob Johnson of Vale at the final gun. Johnson missed the free throw and Myrtle Point had third place.

Vale led 31-10 at halftime. Reedsport scored 26 points in the final quarter to down
