**Morse Remaining Silent About Reaction to Events in Oregon**

Washington (Special)—Sen. Wayne Morse is maintaining a rigid silence about his reaction to the tumultuous events in Oregon of recent days which have catapulted Maurice Neuberger and Elmo Smith into the limelight.

A. Robert Smith as contenders for the right to become Morse's colleague in the Senate.

"No comment" is the senator's stock answer to all questions about his intentions regarding the upcoming senatorial political race in Oregon. When it is suggested to Morse that this silence is uncharacteristic, he replies that it is "rich in meaning."

What the meaning is, however, he won't say. No outward sign.

As of now he shows no outward sign of being any more

favorably disposed to the candidacy of Mrs. Neuberger than he was toward her late husband's candidacy for reelection. His intentions toward Sen. Neuberger were to make it plain that they had differences on certain issues—such as postal increases, which is again before Congress—but not to stump the state against him nor to attempt to defeat him in favor of any Republican opponent. To Morse, Neuberger's reelection, had he lived, was a fore-

gone conclusion. Morse's introduction of a bill to re-name John Day dam after Neuberger is one he swiftly introduced last Wednesday a few minutes after reading a wire from the executive board of the Democratic party in Oregon. He had earlier received a letter conveying the suggestion from Beulah Hand, vice chairman of the party. He replied that he wanted to know what the sentiment of party leaders might be. They quickly endorsed the idea of honoring Neuberger in the same way that Sen. Charles McNary was honored with a Columbia River project.

Asked if he planned to push the bill, Morse said flatly: "I think the bill will be enacted."

Morse is not so ready to endorse the new national seashore bill for the Oregon coast, which under newly introduced legislation would be named for Neuberger.

"I'm going to study it," is all he would say.

**Cool to Seashore Park**  
The sponsors of the Neuberger seashore bill figure that renaming it for the man the Senate spent 3 1/2 hours eulogizing will give its chances of enactment a boost. Morse in the past has been cool to the seashore park idea.

Mrs. Neuberger is reported here to prefer that the seashore rather than John Day dam be named for her husband. The likelihood that Congress would vote to name more than one major public project after the same person appears remote. Rep. Walter Norblad's suggestion that Neuberger's name be attached to the Willamette Valley Green Peter dam, which will be started this year in all likelihood, is running a poor third in the list of prospects.

So it looks like it may come down to an early test of Senate sentiment, if not strength, between Morse and Mrs. Neuberger. Unless the Senate passes both measures, it has to take a choice between the Morse bill for renaming John Day dam and the seashore bill which Mrs. Neuberger prefers.

**Could Deaden Prospects**  
If Morse can get the Senate to move swiftly on his bill, this move could deaden the prospects of the "Richard L. Neuberger National Seashore." But the seashore bill is being sponsored by two key senators—Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.) and Thomas Kuchel (R-Calif.), the two party whips in the Senate.

The new incoming senator, Hall S. Lusk, may have something to say about this. If he sides with Morse, the Senate is unlikely to enact any legislation distasteful to both Oregon senators when it concerns an Oregon project. But if Lusk favors the Neuberger seashore idea, it could conceivably be enacted this year.

One thing appears certain at this stage: the Morse-Neuberger controversy is destined to continue—an immediate legacy which Dick Neuberger would joyfully have left to his surviving colleagues.
